### **HOW DOES OPRA WORK?**

We have in the past tried to explain just what OPRA is and what it can do, but there still is some confusion. It is as you know a Charity and has to abide by the Charities Commission rules. It has to pass the 'public benefit' test and that is, by organising or financially supporting activities and projects that probably wouldn't happen without our support.

For example, we are able under our charitable status to use our funds to support events such as our Christmas Dinner for seniors or the Easter Egg Hunt for children. We are also able to support other organisations in the community such as the Mother and Toddler group and the Village School or Chat and Chill for the older children.

The Annual Fireworks display and Christmas Tree Lights benefit the whole village and so can be funded by OPRA. On the other hand, the Summer Ball earlier in the summer could not be described as a charitable activity (just a good night out), so to budget for a loss would have been wrong. As it happens we made a £100 profit which has gone into the funds.

The very successful Friday Coffee Mornings were pump primed by OPRA funds, but is now totally independent. A good example of how we like to work.

If you have an idea which would benefit people in the village or want to organise a trip (which isn't self selecting), then maybe OPRA can help make it happen. However the OPRA Trustees have a duty to ensure that the money we raise is spent to benefit as many people as possible.
