OTTERHAMPTON VILLAGE HALL AGM

The village hall is managed by a committee made up of seven elected members, three co-opted members and three representatives from regular user groups.

The AGM is on Saturday 18th May 2013 at 11.00am

Everyone in the community is entitled to attend and vote for the nominees who are standing as elected members. The village hall is managed by the committee on behalf of the community and the AGM is your opportunity to make your views known to the committee.

The hall is over 100 years old and has had many improvements over the years. However the building is showing its age and needs lots of work to meet the needs of the future. Last year we conducted a survey that showed the majority of the community wanted to keep the existing hall rather than build a new in another location.

Major refurbishment of the hall is a long term goal but in the short term the existing building needs to be kept in good repair. Volunteers are urgently needed to join our working parties to help carry out running repairs, no experience needed just enthusiasm although plumbing, electrical or plastering expertise would be welcome.

COLD CALLING INITIATIVE

Building on the successful pilot scheme in Sedgemoor, the 'No Cold Calling Zone' initiative is being expanded into other residential areas and rural villages. This scheme empowers individual residents and communities to stand up to uninvited callers, by advising them through street signage and door stickers that they are not welcome in the area.

Our local PCSO, with the agreement of the Parish Council, will be carrying out a survey with a view to getting the villages in the our parish designated as a 'NO COLD CALLING ZONE'.

Should cold callers disregard this advice or if traders break any of the laws which protect consumers, then both the Police and Somerset County Council Trading Standards will take action.

PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL ASSEMBLY

The Parish Annual Assembly was held on 1st May and gave the chance for people in the parish to have their say on any subject. The topics brought up were;

- Defibrillator we now have five people in the parish who attended a course on CPR and using the defibrillator. The PC were asked to expedite the site selection and installation. To make it available externally it must be kept in a temperature controlled container. For the interim period it will be available, during normal opening hours, from the Post Office.
- First Aiders There are many people in the parish who are qualified first aiders who can carry out CPR. It was suggested that we should publish a list of these people who would be prepared to respond in an emergency.
- Dog Fouling This is a serious problem, especially around the school, along the riverbank and on the common, caused by irresponsible dog owners. The PC were asked to highlight this and to arrange regular visits by the dog warden as there have been a substantial number of successful prosecutions in other Sedgemoor areas.
- Village Agents Yvonne Bulman the newly appointed village agent gave a short presentation on her role. See facing page.

The Parish Council Annual Meeting followed on from the public session and the public were welcomed to stay and listen.

Mervyn Brown stood down as chairperson and Paul Gripton was proposed, seconded and voted in as the chairperson and likewise John Marriott as vice-chairperson.

KEEP YOUR DOG UNDER CLOSE CONTROL THIS SPRING

Nothing is more evocative of spring than seeing new lambs by their mothers out in the Quantock countryside.

But, please remember that it is at this time of year when sheep and lambs are at their most vulnerable. Quantock Rangers, local farmers and the Police would like to highlight the problems that some dogs can cause to livestock on the hills.

From 1st March dog owners are required by law to keep their dogs on a lead when being walked across Open Access land. In all other areas of the countryside dogs should be kept under close control. It's not just the physical attacks that cause harm but simply allowing a dog to chase sheep may cause ewes to abort or become injured.

Owen Jones, Quantock AONB Ranger said "I'm a dog owner myself and there's nothing I enjoy more than walking over the hills with my spaniel, but I have to remember that sheep, lambs and wildlife can easily be disturbed if the dogs, no matter how well trained, are not under very close control".

Owen went on to say "There have been many times when Quantock Rangers have had to deal with the aftermath of dog attacks on sheep and in all cases I believe they could have been easily avoided - it's never easy visiting a farmer to tell them that their livestock has been injured or killed".

If your dog does kill or cause harm to livestock, you can be liable for a significant fine and for the value of the livestock harmed - your pet may also be dispatched, the cost of which will have to be borne by you. Moreover, if your dog is actually seen harassing livestock it could be shot on sight.

If you actually witness an attack in progress, call **999** otherwise any incidents witnessed should be reported to the Police on **0845 456 7000** or directly to the Quantock Hills AONB Office on **01823 451884**.
