Otterhampton Offcuts

Snippets from the October and November 2015 Parish Council and other meetings

Bus Service

We have requested a meeting with WebberBus and Somerset County Council (SCC) to discuss parishioners' concerns at the declining bus service from Bridgwater and to request that passengers are dropped off by the bus shelter rather than the layby, to avoid crossing the busy main road.

Proposed Enhanced Play and Recreation Area

We have now selected our preferred tenderer to provide the enhanced play and recreation area. Two out of the three external funding applications have been submitted. We are awaiting the

outcome of these before submitting the final one to Hinkley the С Community Impact Mitigation Fund. The parish council has granted £2500. OPRA has generously donated £1000 and the balance of £307 from Chat and Chill when it disbanded will also be used as match funding.



The project will cost around £95,000. Subject to securing the funding, work is planned to start April 2016 with completion May 2016. A big thank you to the team who have worked so hard on this project; not forgetting all those who wrote letters and signed forms in support of the scheme.

Parish Councillor Vacancy

We have a parish councillor vacancy following Stuart Mason's resignation. It is intended to fill this position by co -option and anyone interested in applying for the position, please contact the Clerk for a 'simple' application form. This should be returned by 11 December. Parish Council life is varied, interesting and very rewarding. If you think you might like to be involved in making a real difference to our community, please do apply. You can contact the Clerk or any councillor if you wish to find out more.

Parish Precept (local part of your council tax bill)

In the next couple of months we have to set our Precept (budget) for the 2016/17 financial year. These are the funds required to discharge our responsibilities. The funds are from Sedgemoor District Council, collected through the Council Tax. The current Precept is £17500. Items we are responsible for include grass cutting, grounds maintenance, children's play area, defibrillator, enhancements, small grants as well as statutory obligations such as insurance, accounts and audit. Residents are invited to attend the meeting which will be held on 9 December in the village hall. The Precept will then be formally approved at the January 2016 parish council meeting.

Highways Issues

The pedestrian barriers between Estuary Park and the Wharf Road were widened during October to allow easier access for those with mobility issues. Hopefully the recent works clearing the 'grips' along the C182 will allow improved water run-off, so places such as Dame Withycome Hill will not be so treacherous in periods of heavy rain. Although other improvements were agreed such as flood poles at Steart, these have not yet materialised. Similarly, the suggestion submitted by a resident for a change of priority at the junction of Brookside Rd and other speed reduction initiatives are awaiting a response from Highways. We have erected a temporary solar light at the bus shelter.

Operation HAROLD (Hinkley Alternative Routes Operating Local Diversions) – Presentation by Avon and Somerset Police

This is the Avon and Somerset's traffic management plan in the event of a closure of the C182 between Cannington and Hinkley Point. The project has identified a single inbound route to Hinkley and three one-way outbound routes which will depend on the location of the blockage. Its aim of course, is to keep the traffic moving. The Police wish to publicise this operation with residents of the affected parishes, hence the presentation on 3rd December, 7pm, prior to the parish council meeting.

Community Car Scheme

The second meeting was held on 2 November. As reported previously, we have plenty of volunteer drivers – thank you. We now also have a Treasurer, but still just one volunteer co-ordinator and we really need one or two more. The co-ordinator will take calls from passengers on a dedicated mobile phone (to be provided) and assign the

journey to a driver. It should not be too onerous, because we can specify booking times etc. If we have two (or three) co-ordinators it means the role can be shared, perhaps on a weekly basis. Later on we will need a Chairman/ Secretary. This scheme will be a great community asset, predominately for health and social journeys for those without their own or access to transport, at a time when public transport is in serious decline. The scheme will include Combwich, Otterhampton, Steart and Stockland Bristol.

Combwich Buoy

We are sure you will have noticed the return of the buoy on the flood bank by the Pill. The remaining refurbishment work is being carried out by volunteers from the Combwich Boat Club. It will be painted in the traditional red and white colours. The iron cage, which will be painted black and then fitted, will complete the works. A huge thank you and much appreciation to the boat club members.

A 20mph speed limit for Combwich?

The parish council recently made enquiries with Somerset Highways Department, about having a 20mph speed limit in the village, only to be told that, 'there was no statistical evidence that it was necessary.' This was presumably a reference to the fact that there have been no incidents in Combwich resulting in injuries or worse, from road accidents. A few years ago a similar request was turned down, on the basis that the average speed in the village was 28.5mph, demonstrating that the present limit was adequate.

In common with many people, some of whom may live in Combwich, one of our councillors recently attended a speed awareness training course, because he was caught by a camera, driving at 33 mph on Taunton Road in Bridgwater. One of the most memorable aspects of

the training was a section that dealt with the differing consequences for a pedestrian being struck by a modern car at 20 mph and 30 mph. At the lower speed the chances of death or serious injury are radically less than at 30 mph. So where is the logic of the Highways Department to refuse to impose the lower limit, you may ask?

We are lucky enough to live in a cul de sac village, where there is no through traffic. If you're driving here you're either going somewhere in Combwich or you're leaving the village. Either way, the time anyone can save by driving faster than 20 mph, can only be measured in seconds. But when we're in a hurry, logic flies out of the (car) window. And sometimes, we might be nudging that 30 mph figure. If we could agree to a voluntary 20 mph limit in Combwich and if there was a polite and well designed sign reminding us of that agreement, it would obviate the need for further discussion with Highways. And it would almost certainly contribute to us staying below what could be the fatal figure.

So please let the parish council know your views. We all share this space and mostly, we do that with consideration and kindness. We park carefully, we give way where cars are necessarily parked in the road and we remember the kids and older people who represent a greater risk of stepping out unexpectedly. We watch out for the cats and dogs who belong to our fellow villagers. Please support this suggestion. A 20 mph limit would help to make the village safer for all of us, for a negligible cost.

Steart Marshes - Dick Best on the natural history of the parish



".....more things in *heaven and earth*"

The past few weeks have seen many spectacular natural phenomena in our little part of the globe. A spring tide in late September was predicted to be the highest the Severn Estuary over a twenty-year period. However, tides are fickle things and although the timing of a tide is fairly accurate its height is dependent on the prevailing weather, wind and atmospheric pressure. The weather at the time of this spring tide was beautiful with plenty of sunshine and little wind, all associated with a period of high pressure which, much to the relief of Steart residents, suppressed the mega-tide, the height of water on Wall

Common was at least a foot (30cm) lower than some recent high spring tides.

High tides are associated with full moons and this high tide was associated with a much advertised "supermoon". For several nights we all had the magical spectacle of this huge orange moon rising through a clear cloudless sky. If that was not enough, late one night during this period there was a total eclipse of the moon, providing (especially for those with weak bladders!) the eerie sight of a pale moon gradually creeping out from behind the earth's shadow.

Then in early October there was an almost unprecedented occurrence of the northern lights (aurora borealis) being seen this far south and from the Quantocks some spectacular photographs were taken showing a green curtain of light hanging over South Wales.

While they are doing this a second person goes through their bags in the boot or foot well of the car taking any debit/ credit cards they can find. On a totally different note – have you had your flu jab yet? If not, do ring the surgery and make an appointment, the 'jab' does not hurt and it only takes a few minutes and helps to give you some immunity against the flu – much better the jab than the miseries of the illness.

Somerset County Council Chairman's Award 2015



The parish council are delighted that John and Elizabeth Marriott have received the Somerset County Council Chairman's Award for Service to the Community.

Citation

Elizabeth and John Marriott are an example of what is best in village life. They have played a leading role in a number of village organisations until John's ill health forced them to take a back seat, including a local recreational charity where Elizabeth was Secretary and John edited the newsletter and helped organise a range of activities. For years they were on the village hall committee of which Elizabeth was secretary and John organised the refurbishment and

carried out day to day maintenance. John was also a conscientious Otterhampton parish councillor for seven years, and as you would expect, took his duties very seriously. He also produced the parish council newsletter. They both helped to set up and organise the village market at which John's home baked bread was a real treat.

They are also good neighbours always ready to help whenever needed. The whole community will be delighted with this award.

A Story for our time (contributed)

"There is a good story about a fictional boat race between the national health service and a Japanese crew. They both worked long and hard to maximise their performance and the Japanese won by a mile; so they set up a working party as they always do in those circumstances.

And the working party concluded that the Japanese had 8 people rowing and 1 steering and the NHS had 8 people steering and 1 rowing. So, the NHS employed consultants, which is what you do when a crisis of that kind occurs, and 18 months and about £5million later, confirmed that diagnosis the consultants and recommended that the NHS crew be completely restructured.
