WW1 Centenary Commemorations

Following the consultation in September, the flagpole was erected opposite the Post Office with a 'Lest we Forget' flag that has been flying since 1.11.18. We also made a large poppy and affixed it to the welcome feature at the entrance to the village. Our thanks to Caron & Gordon Coldwell who helped with the design, Robin Prowse who made the poppy and who, along




with Simon Darch, erected the flagpole. Many thanks also to Mike Ingram who laid the concrete for the flagpole base free of charge. If there are any flags you would

like to see atop the flagpole, please let the Clerk know and councillors if appropriate, will (agree or not) to the suggestion at the following parish council meeting.

Whilst the flagpole was in progress, we also noticed the stone trough by the notice board which looks lovely. This is kindly planted up and tended by Helen Jowett, so a thank you to Helen too.

Community Plan

As per the front cover, we are holding a big community event on 8.12.18. Part of this includes public consultation on the Community Plan. We first developed the Plan in 2011 (amended in 2012) after extensive consultations with the community, driven mostly by the proposals to construct Hinkley C, the Wharf and laydown area, and the development of WWT Steart Marshes. A lot has happened in the intervening years such as the start of the Hinkley C build, the refurbished play area, cycle path to Cannington, the Friday coffee mornings, Otter Wheels and the loss of the public bus service. The Plan has been updated to reflect these changes.



Affordable Housing Survey

Following on from the item above, we have asked SDC to come and talk to us at a parish council meeting (hopefully January or February) with a view to



conducting a new Affordable Housing Survey in the parish. The previous one carried out in 2012 suggested there was a need for 6 affordable units, so this may also change. We will let you know the meeting date when confirmed.

Highways - Dame Withycombe Hill Layby Widening

The contracts have been placed and Highways are negotiating a slot in the contractor's programme to schedule the work (hopefully before 31.3.19). The work should take 5 days (or less) and traffic lights will be erected for the duration so we can expect some disruption. SCC will give advanced notification of the works to residents.

Hinkley Point C Community Fund

We are delighted to report that 2 further parish projects have been awarded funding from the parish community fund. The Village Hall Refurbishment (Phase 1a – design stage) circa £12.8k (plus £3k for a project manager and business support) and a new wooden gig £22.5k which will enable more rowers to be out on the water simultaneously and also will allow participation in races and regattas.

SCC Highways Winter Services

You probably won't want to be reminded, but we are planning for the forthcoming winter. Previously we obtained bags of gritting salt from Highways free of charge, but from this year we will have to pay for them at a cost of £4.74 per 25 kg bag. We used 6 bags last year; not a great cost, but it all adds up from our precept (budget). If you are not aware, the parish council has a garage at Brookside Road where we store sand & bags (flood prevention) and grit (ice and snow conditions) plus shovels. The keyholders are Barry Leathwood, Julie Evans, Bob Birkenhead and the Clerk. Their phone numbers are on the previous page.

Large Loads on C182

We have been forewarned of some imminent, very big loads (Abnormal Indivisible Loads – AILs) that will be coming into Combwich Wharf by boat and travelling onwards to Hinkley Point C by road which will cause disruption and almost certainly some delays. These vehicles will be some 9 metres wide. This is all the information we have currently due to we suspect, security considerations. However if we are given any better information we will try and inform you via the notice boards, website, coffee morning etc.

The familiar **Pavilion** (or shed as some refer to it) on the common, is coming to the end of its useful life and we are looking for a replacement. On high tides there are several inches of water inside which not only damages the gear we store in it, but the building itself. Older residents will remember the previous building floating away on a high tide never to be seen again! We are in the process of researching the possibilities, but it is likely that the replacement will be in the same place but 18 inches (45 cms) higher. Planning permission will be required and funding found. More on this in the next issue.

1st Combwich Brownies by Liz Brown

The 1st Combwich Brownies celebrated their 40th birthday this September with a surprise party for the girls. They were joined by some adults who had been Brownies at Combwich over the years and several invited guests including Jean Kibby who had started the unit in 1978. We are especially proud of our 40 vears, because we are the only unit in the area to have stayed continuously open, Nether Stowey and Cannington both having been closed for periods of time. There was a great display of photos of the Brownies over the years and it was interesting to see how both the uniform and the activities have changed over 40 years. However what has remained unchanged is the fun that



the girls have and the ethos of Brownies within the umbrella of Girl Guiding U. K. which remains committed to the idea of empowering girls and giving them a broad and varied programme to work with.

Having said that, girl guiding has just launched an entirely new and exciting programme which spans the years from Rainbows to Rangers and gives girls continuity throughout their time in guiding. It has been brought right up to the 21st century, the rangers even having a festival goer badge! We are having fun at

the moment getting to grips with this new programme and OPRA very generously donated money to help with the purchase of new badge books for the girls.

One of the new badges for Brownies is a charities badge and all our girls are currently working on this. Our chosen charity for our Christmas good turn is the Bridgwater food bank which does a tremendous amount of good work throughout Bridgwater. The Brownies are collecting money in giant smartie tubes





by doing good turns. At the beginning of December we will be taking them shopping to buy the non-perishable goods needed by the food bank and the following week the girls will take their purchases to the food bank and help to make up some food parcels for families. If anybody would like to help us with this venture we would be very grateful for any donations of money or non-perishable items of food by the beginning of December. Donations can be

taken to the Combwich coffee morning on a Friday or to the Brownie meeting on Monday November 26th 6-7.30 p.m.

Agnes Dougall - profile



Agnes Dougall is well known in Combwich, a regular at the Friday Morning Coffee Club and a passionate member of the Combwich Short Mat Bowls Club with her husband Tom until he very sadly died in February last year. Agnes still enjoys the Coffee Club where she meets old friends and occasionally goes to the Short Mat Bowls club evenings where she says they are very patient with her as she is now partially sighted.

These days she values the new technology provided by audio books and a machine which will magnify text and read it out to her. See photograph left. But like most of us she has a past. Brought up on the banks of the Clyde in a top floor tenement block in the 1930s. Decent jobs were hard to find, so at the age of 18 years decided to do her bit for the war effort and

signed up to Women's Royal Naval Service (WRNS) more popularly known as the WRENS.

Her training was in Tullichewan Castle on the banks of Loch Lomond. Her first duties together with the other "girls" included such menial tasks as scrubbing floors, but her potential was soon recognised, and she became a "writer" and trained in a number of wartime administrative tasks. The trainees were sent to various naval bases, but Agnes was taken ill with appendicitis and, after an operation, spent 6 weeks recuperating which delayed her posting to Eglinton near Londonderry in Northern Ireland in 1943 which was a Fleet Air Arm training station sometimes accommodating US pilots.

She lived with 15 other women in Hut 7, a wooden structure, and enjoyed a lively social life on the station with a regular Saturday night dances. Six monthly trips home were allowed, and these were occasionally made on Dakota aircraft and other military aircraft.

Her role together with two other Wrens was in flight control, and involved monitoring and recording aircraft movements and radio communications at the base until the end of the war. She remembers being taken to Londonderry to witness the surrender of the German U-Boat fleet in May

1945 and also the visit of Princess Elizabeth

and Princes Margaret.

After the war she returned home and secured employment in a local engineering company where she met and married Tom and bought their first house in Glasgow. They later moved to Bolton and from there Tom travelled the world as part of his job. When he retired in 1991 they moved to Combwich.

News from the Otterhampton Village Hall Committee

Exciting new developments at the Village Hall

Work is progressing on the proposed refurbishment of the village hall. As you know the results of the independent survey of all Otterhampton residents earlier in the year recorded that the majority of people who replied were very much in favour of refurbishing the village hall. Given that mandate planning application to Sedgemoor District Council has been made for the external works which includes a disability access ramp, stunning new entrance and windows throughout, repointing of the exposed masonry and installation of plank cladding, velux windows in the bowls room and solar panels.

The plans will create a visually exciting village hall which will have first class facilities for all villagers and all occasions.

The Village Hall Committee is now considering the first draft plans for the internal layout of the building. The current facilities will remain but we will be upgrading throughout including the WCs, heating, electrical and drainage services, installing a lift to the first floor and taking the opportunity to move the kitchen and Harbour View bar facilities to create a large attractive lounge area. We are talking to members of the groups who regularly use the hall facilities to make sure we fully understand the specific needs of each individual club. But we also want to make sure we capture everyone's views as the hall belongs to the residents of Otterhampton. So come and see the exciting plans and have your say at the consultation day on 8th December (between 10am and 3pm). *Your views are needed to help shape the new village hall.*







Once we have agreement from Sedgemoor District Council we will be able to seek tenders for the work and then submit our bid to the Hinkley Point C Community Fund (used to be called the CIM Fund) and other grant organisations. Refurbishment work will then begin next year. To help raise some funds the Village Hall has printed Christmas cards showing a view of Combwich village in the snow. The cards will be available to buy at the Friday Morning Coffee Club, the Harbour View Bar and the village markets. The cost is £5 for 10 large cards.

Wildlife

With Autumn passage still in progress another few rarities have popped up on the reserve including a Glossy Ibis on Stockland and a Long-Billed Dowitcher (An American wader) which was seen briefly on the River Parrott. 12 Cattle Egret have also been very regularly out on Stockland marsh, along with 2 very mobile Spoonbills spotted across the

reserve. Wintering numbers of waders and wildfowl are also building up with already 500+ Lapwing and Golden Plover seen from the Quantock hides. Flocks of Avocet have built up to well over 350 and can be seen on the higher tides on the river.

With most flowers over one of the remaining highlights of the plant kingdom are teasels (*Dipsacus Fullonum*) and there are plenty at the fresh water areas of the marshes. They are a great food plant for bees due to their abundance of small flowers, later in the year the seeds heads also attract a range of small birds particularly goldfinches for which they are a very important winter food source.

They were used in the wool and flax industries to tease, this process cleaned and raise the nap of the material, and in the wool industry this created the term teased wool.

Management

On October 11th, WWT held their AGM at Slimbridge and I had the privilege of being asked to talk about the changes that have occurred on site over the last 4 years. The main highlights being the development of the saltmarsh plants, with 15 key species already



established and the wintering bird



reaching over 25,000 with 10 species obtaining national importance levels. It was great to be able to share the success of the site with our members and report back that the habitat is developing as was intended.

Lantern Parade - a message from the creator Sarah Webb

This year's lantern parade had the theme of the Vikings landing in the pill in the Year 845 from which they laid siege to Cannington where they suffered a major defeat: several years later they returned and again were also defeated. Eventually they did manage to invade us, and the rest is history.

The children made lanterns around this theme and during the week constructed 45 lanterns in the shape of swords, axes, helmets and shields some of which were used to adorn the Viking longboats, which were made by volunteers from the Gig rowing club, Harbour view Players, Harbour View Social Club and Village hall Committee. We were also lucky enough to have several members of the Choir and a couple of village residents Paul and Carol on the team as well.

The whole Parade was put together in a week and used 1 and ½ Gallons of glue, 39 rolls of masking tape, 2 bundles of willow, 693 sheets of tissue paper and 100 sets of lights. The two Viking long ships named Spirit and Bills Boat after the village gigs, took 196-man hours to create and 9 people to man.

I would like to thank all the volunteers for their hard work and commitment to the project, especially my right-hand woman Jude Cound from the Harbour view Players who worked along side me to orchestrate the whole parade and show, Tina and Michael Gardener for their support, OPRA for organising the event and providing funding, the Village Hall for the use of the hall and skittle alley, the children and parents for coming along, the Post office for sorting the bookings,



the Marshalls, BBQ and firework team, and everyone who came out to support us on the night.

Notes from your Village Agent

Scams! We do talk about them a lot but it is important to do so as they can be really disturbing to receive and potentially very expensive.

We seem to have had a rise in a particular phone call and so I thought it wise to share. Sharing makes us remember to be vigilant and helps us to know what we may be faced with and so to act confidently.

The recent call is from a well - spoken lady who tells you that there is a court case pending against you. It is often for unpaid tax. She will ask you to call her back on a given number. This is usually a premium number and will be costing you lots of money while they slowly ask for all your details!



I have fallen foul to clicking on emails before I have really thought about it. I had one for a fixed penalty fine. Indignantly I opened it, thinking of all the potential scenarios of what I might have done wrong! I then realised that it would not have been sent by email and most certainly not to my work email. I was lucky to be able to seek reassurance that I hadn't crashed the entire company system through our tech support but many people can be left worrying.

The advice from us hasn't really changed, put the phone down quickly and don't talk. Chat to a neighbour or call me or Citizen's Advice if you are anxious about what you did. You can also report it on the Action fraud

website www.actionfraud.police.uk phone number 0300 123 2040. The latter also have information about recent scams to watch out for. You can also tap the phone number into your search engine (google it!) and it will tell you what type of phone number it is. According to Which, www.which.co.uk/consumer-rights/advice/premium-rate-number-scams "To avoid being ripped off in this way, you should firstly never use numbers beginning with 084, 087, 090, 091 or 098 when calling government advice lines"

Don't forget that you can buy phones with a call blocker service or use the BT call blocker service. This means that the phone will only automatically answer numbers that you have previously agreed to. It will ask the caller to put in who you are and display it so that the call recipient can decide whether to take the call.

This is also useful if you care for someone with dementia because they are less likely to share all your bank details with the caller if they have to press the correct buttons to release the call.

The last and most disturbing scam is when people who are helping us by picking up our money from the bank are really helping themselves to your savings. This is called "Mate Crime". Get them to take you to the bank rather than giving them your card and pin. Get help from CAB or a money wise service to put your bills on direct debit and use phone or internet access to your bank accounts. Check your statements for any strange activity. Make sure that any private carers have a current DBS certificate. Ask me to support you with this.

Remember, if you do feel suspicious or uncomfortable about door to door, email, phone or "Mate" contact, talk to someone trusted straight away. Keeping it to yourself makes anything you might have actually done far worse and by sharing it, you can remove your own anxiety and stop someone else from making the same mistake!

C182 (Hinkley Road) and Trees

Change to speed limit on C182

On Valentine's Day this year I spent an hour in the company of 2 Community Police Officers, Esther and Sue, whose duties include patrolling the C182 as part of the Hinkley Beat. We all get frustrated when we see poor driving on that road and my thanks goes to all on that Beat who work day in day out to make it as safe



as it can be. They feel just as passionately as all of us about the hazards this road presents and the changing nature of those hazards amplified by the increased use of the road while HPC is built. Not the kind of passion you usually associate with Valentine's Day but

We monitored traffic on the road between 08:00 and 09:00 between Dame Withycombe Hill and the turning to Steart Marshes; a stretch of road that forms part of our Parish. I had the opportunity to try my hand with a speed gun – not as easy as it looks! The speed limit on our stretch of the C182 from Cannington through to Stockland Bristol has changed and is a 50 mph maximum. Esther & Sue were keen to remind me that a speed limit is just that; a limit not to be exceeded NOT a target speed.

Many of us drive along this road several times daily and that familiarity can breed contempt. There are parts of the road that do not lend themselves to travel at more than 30/40mph due to the bends, the width and the camber of the road and the size of oncoming vehicles. This was borne out by my incompetent use of a speed gun. Sometimes I think we perceive that vehicles are travelling faster than they are – it feels faster because the road is narrow.

I repeated the experience a month later this time at the junction Brookside Road with the C182. We monitored traffic between 07:30 and 08:30. I expected to find that vehicles were travelling much faster as they approach the junction especially coming from Hinkley Point; but in fact it reaffirmed the conclusions I had drawn a month earlier. Perception and fact do not always align!

Now that the new speed limit has been implemented I further repeated this experience between 12:50 and 13:50 on a sunny Friday at the very beginning of this month at the junction of Combwich with the C182. Sue and I recorded 545 traffic movements (vehicles passing us in either direction), including 49 lorries and 34 buses, in that time; admittedly a busy time on a Friday when Hinkley B workers leave early for the weekend. However, when Sue asked me to estimate how many had passed less than half an hour after we had started my perception was about 100 in fact it was already nearly 250! It would appear that our powers of perception in terms of both speed and numbers is extremely unreliable.

Here's wishing everyone happy and safe driving under 50. It's one way we can all stay under that landmark number and do our bit to keep our local road free of any more serious accidents.

Our Green and Pleasant Village

We are fortunate to take for granted a local environment with plenty of green spaces. There are however some spaces within the village confines that have to be managed and maintained to provide us with an effortless effect.

Your Parish Council has recently formed a small group to look at these spaces and think about how they can be enhanced. 3 Parish Councillors are being very helpfully advised by a local tree surgeon who is giving his time to the project.

In the first instance the attention of the group is focussed on 3 areas of the village, in brief we are thinking about,

- at the entrance to the village abutting the C182, planting some more colourful species of tree.
- at the area by "the green boxes" and telephone box, which is a focal point as you drive into the village, planting a feature tree, again with some colour and taking out the rather unsightly and potentially dangerous willow by the telephone box, so be warned it may look a little bare for a while!
- at the Brownie Copse on the left of the track by the common, applying for Local Nature Reserve status and extending the area with more native trees properly.

Obviously, given the time taken for trees to grow this is something of a legacy project which will feed into Parish Council budgets for years to come. We hope to have some visual ideas ready to display at the forthcoming Open Day in December and as ever invite your ideas and comments. We would also welcome anyone who would like to volunteer to join our group.

STEART VILLAGE HAS A "FREEMAN"

Army Captain Honoured

ONE of the loneliest places in England, the hamlet of Steart, near Bridgwater, put itself on the map this week-end when as part of the proceedings at a British Legion dinner in the neighbouring village of Combwich, "The Freedom of Steart" was conferred on Capt. R. L. Varney (Royal Signals), who during the war has been in charge of a wireless station there.

A local farmer, Mr Victor Biffin, wearing appropriate "robes of office," performed the ceremony, during which Capt. Varney was presented with a huge key.

Steart has a population of 26, no public-house, no shops, no main services, and the residents have to walk over two miles to catch a 'bus to the nearest town. Bridgwater, which is nine miles off.

Three times recently Steart has been cut off by heavy seas which have swept across the only road and inundated the fields.

The hamlet is proud of its only serving man, Sgt. Pitman, who is with the Army in C.M.F. An interesting cutting from a newspaper shortly after the Second World War referring to Captain R L Varney (Royal Signals) who was awarded the Freedom of Steart for his service in charge of the military radio station there.

The article also states that the hamlet is proud of its only serving man who was with the army in C.M.F. He is a relative of Pauline Hurley who lives in Steart.

Apparently in the then recent times, Steart was cut off by high seas when the only road was under water.

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
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Do you have photographs of old Combwich, Otterhampton or Steart?
