Do you remember these old buildings? These are just two images from our recent history which exist in the memories of some local people. There are many more of this period and much earlier, all of which helped to shape our community.





New Year Greetings


We hope you all had a good Christmas and we wish you sincere best wishes, health and happiness for the New Year.

Community Plan Open Day 8.12.18

We thank those of you who attended the Community Plan Open Day which was held in parallel with the Village Hall refurbishment consultation and the village market. Your suggestions and comments will be incorporated into the Plan to produce a final draft. Not surprisingly, highways (including parking) public transport and also lighting at the bus shelter featured strongly. We are currently making some enquiries for lighting options at the bus shelter, and in time, will follow up the other items to consider if feasible and/or whether we are able to deliver any of them. We hope to finalise the revised plan and print it to issue in the Spring.

Affordable Housing Survey

The affordable housing team from Sedgemoor District Council will be at the next parish council meeting on 7 February to talk to us about conducting a new affordable housing survey. If appropriate the survey will determine the need (or not) for numbers of affordable housing units in the parish.



Annual Precept for 2019/20

The Precept is the amount of money we require to discharge our duties within the remit and powers as a parish council. Councillors reviewed the expenditure on a line by line basis and decided that the precept would need to be increased from £23000 to £26000 to meet ongoing obligations and new items. Within this figure, we have set aside funds for tree maintenance works, new tree planting as recommended by the tree strategy and open spaces steering group, and Otter Tales printing costs. We also set aside approximately £3200 each year to accumulate funds; i.e. Reserves, for Election Costs (if required) Buoy Maintenance, Play and Recreation Area (maintenance and future replacement), Computing Equipment, Combwich Track Maintenance and 25% of the total precept (as recommended by the Somerset Association of Local Councils), for emergencies. The additional £3000 will increase the average amount paid by a Band D tax payer from £74.20 to £84.42 (£10.22) per annum.

A detailed financial statement of our costs and projections is available for inspection at any time. Please contact the Clerk if you would like a copy or wish to discuss any element of the finances.

Combwich Wharf

At the Transport Forum on 1 November, EDF advised that the original plan was to redevelop the wharf as the existing layout does not meet the needs of the HPC project. The decision has now been taken to completely demolish the existing structure and replace it. The project has now reached its detailed design phase which will be reviewed in January 2019. Site enabling works will also commence in January 2019.

The wharf needs to be functional to receive its first load in January 2020. The barges will be 30metres wide and 90 metres long with a load capacity of 4,000 tonnes. Under the current schedule, work on site will be finished entirely in the second or third quarter of 2020. The access road to

the C182 will be widened in order to allow it to receive abnormal loads. This will involve the construction of a layby that will handle abnormal loads waiting for an appropriate time to use the highway. This work is scheduled commence in March or April of 2019. Once construction starts in spring 2019 there will be drop -in sessions in Combwich to keep interested parties updated.




Somerset's Brilliant Coast Project

At our January meeting we received a presentation by the Somerset Wildlife Trust which has obtained central Hinkley Community Impact Mitigation Funding to develop and deliver community engagement, education and volunteering initiatives across the Somerset coast that celebrates the coastal wildlife and landscapes. Its aims are to support local communities and volunteers to help look after and value it. One of the elements of this project "Parish Shores" is a participatory approach to engage the community through local parish councils. News From the Transport Forum

- 1. Junction 23 is open and South Plaza at HPC is operational and HGV drivers shouldn't be having rest breaks in local laybys.
- 2. Quantock Road roundabout works are on hold due to a design problem.
- 3. Minibuses rather than larger vehicles are being used in Nether Stowey now that they are not required elsewhere.
- 4. Sedgemoor Campus Bath Road opened early December
- 5. The biggest crane in the world is coming in hundreds of containers. This will be within the daily caps for vehicle movements. Vehicle movement caps will reduce from Sept 2019 or when the jetty opens if earlier.
- 6. The jetty has been or will shortly be handed over for the fitting of conveyor belt systems. It should be operational by Spring 2019 and is on schedule. 80% of aggregate will then come by sea. Other materials and loads will continue to come by road.
- 7. 3370 people on HPC site now. 126 parking spaces, the use of which is tightly controlled. Most go by bus.

Jumping for Dementia



In July 2018 I lost my Grandad after an 18 month battle with Dementia, he had been in and out of hospital, as well as in a nursing home. All of his carers went above and beyond to make sure he was looked after, as well as supporting his family. Dementia is a horrible disease that changes who people are into someone they aren't, stripping them of their dignity and choice.

I decided to do a sponsored tandem parachute jump from 10,000ft at Redlands Airfield, Swindon to raise money to enable Dementia UK to continue spreading awareness; to

Did you know?

Stert Island was only formed in about 1798 when it broke away from the Steart Peninsular and is a haven for birds, including spotted redshank and whimbrel, and is part of Bridgwater Bay nature reserve. The island is also part of the Otterhampton parish (since 1933) and is uninhabited, although that wasn't always the case.

It was reported in August 1887 that on Steart island there was a "House of Entertainment" brandy and foreign wines could be "run" with ease, and was exempt from the Revenue Authority. It was also described as a



notorious inn in "No Mans Land" off the coast of Burnham and outside the jurisdiction of the law, where thirsty mariners disembarked from ships close by would drink their fill

The road to Steart village, which had a population of arround 70 people in 16 houses, at that time was always vulnerable. A gale in January 1889 swept away the road leaving hardly a trace. Ten years later villagers were still asking for it to be repaired.

Traffic issues in Combwich

Over the last year or two there has been a considerable increase in the number of cars entering the village and quite a bit of inconsiderate parking. Concerns have been raised by residents and by school children alike. Children walking to and from school, vie with cars to make their way along Church Hill and School Lane

Parking on pavements, where they exist, forces pedestrian into the road and poses a particular danger to those with limited mobility using wheelchairs or mobility scooters and parents with pushchairs.

In the March issue of Otter Tales, in conjunction the children from Otterhampton Primary School, we will be looking seriously about what can be done. If you have concerns about these issues please get in touch with the editor or any of the parish councillors.

Otterhampton Parish Footpaths Liaison Officer Bob Birkenhead writes


PARISH PATHS CONSULTATION

Every 12 years Somerset County Council conducts a consultation on public rights of way in the county. As footpath liaison officer for the parish I have received documents outlining the categories for use and maintenance for each footpath. These range from category 1* for routes such as the English Coast Path and The Parrett Trail to category 3 for unused or rarely used footpaths.

Below is a section of our parish showing the various footpaths in the south of the parish; this can be looked at on line via https://roam.somerset.gov.uk/roam/map It possible to zoom in close on this map to see about 400 metres of the network on a computer screen. This then shows up detail of gates, bridges and signposts. If you spot any defects or deficiencies in any of the footpaths then it is possible for you to report these defects on the website. Some recent improvements to gates and signposts have been made as a result of reporting.

Most of the routes are category 2 which are for occasional use by the local community and not promoted locally. Category 1 paths for frequent use are currently 25/14 from Brookside to Lower Hill Farm and 25/29 from Juvenis to Otterhampton. I shall be reviewing these categories and grading them according to the use that that they get. If you have any views on the state of the local footpaths and their frequency of use. 



Agreement for the external work on the building has been granted by Sedgemoor District Council so we can go ahead with the plans to install new double glazing throughout, velux windows in the bowls room and solar heating. The only objection was to the colour of the proposed cladding which we're now reconsidering. We should soon be in a position to finalise the internal design, seek tenders for the proposed work and submit our bids to the Hinkley Point C Community Fund and other grant organisations. Thankfully we have been offered some additional funding to receive support from a local organisation who can assist us with formulating a business plan and applying for funding. How to write your name in basic Egyptian Hieroglyphs

Today's mobile phone texts - "c u l8tr" for example - would make perfect sense to an Egyptian from 4,000 years ago because this is very similar to how hieroglyphs worked in ancient Egypt!

Hieroglyphs stand for *sound sections* within a word, so to write a name in hieroglyphs it has to be written as it *sounds*, not as it's spelt - "Thomas" would be written as Tomas because the 'h' is not pronounced and therefore unnecessary:

Any single letter 'e' in a word was simply omitted because everyone knew the missing vowel was an 'e' - in the same way that the name "Ben" would become "Bn" in a text message today.

If the name is Sheila or Lee or Neil, etc. then the hieroglyph for 'y' would be used in the names, as this is the closest to the *sound* of 'ee'. If the name uses a soft 'c' as in "Celia" then the hieroglyph for 's' would be used; likewise a hard 'c' like "Colin" would be a 'k'.

The letters 'a' and 's' in the list below have a choice of two *different* signs because the artistic composition of the hieroglyphs was very important, so a name written in hieroglyphs like

looks neater when written with the upright hieroglyph for 's' and the horizontal 'a' like this:

but both are correct. Can you translate this name from the list?

The above text is a very basic way of writing names: Tutankhamen's name (simplified) could be written

Management

We have been doing some additional cleaning out of the waterbodies within the wetland walkway. This allows anyone visiting the site to feel connected to the freshwater wetland habitat whilst providing important open areas for birds. It also means that come the spring the water plants that are easily outcompeted have a chance to take root which in turn improves the diversity for all wildlife using the reserve.
