Snippets from your October & November 2019 Parish Council Meetings

Bus shelter

The installation of the lighting tower at the bus shelter was temporarily halted because of an underground diesel leak which has now been resolved. The work should be completed during week commencing 18.11.19.

The bus shelter was recently hit by a vehicle causing damage to the left-hand pillar. This will be repaired shortly. We have for a few years been considering to either refurbish or replace the bus shelter. Recent advice received from a builder suggests that the stone is not very good and the foundation/base could probably do with replacing although we stress that the building is safe. We know that for some, the stone shelter is a bit of a feature at the entrance to the village and would not like to see it replaced with a modern Perspex type shelter. Please let us know your views and comments with regard to a possible replacement, subject of course to cost and availability of funds.

Play Area

We challenged Wicksteed that the safety surfacing (recommended by them) is not fit for purpose as it caused the ground settlement issues and the carbon blacking which in the summer got on children's clothing and skin, which they have refuted. We are now considering our options on how we might effect a permanent and satisfactory solution, recognising that the play area is immensely popular and so well used.

Removal of Willows and Brambles at the brook

Following the removal of the willows and brambles at the brook, a post and three railed wooden fence around the open side will shortly be erected as a safety measure.

Avocet coxed by Kerrie Howard finished 150th fastest on the day in a time of 2 hours, 59.15 minutes.






Both crews represented the village and club wearing racing colours and both boats flying club flags.

Night Time Delivery - By Tim Jones



Towards the end of October on a very rainy night a large barge was nudged into Combwich Wharf by a couple of punchy looking tug boats. It contained four beautifully wrapped large objects which were unloaded over the next couple of days.

Apparently they were the main fuel tanks for the emergency generators on the HPC site and had been manufactured in the Czech Republic. They arrived via Slovakia, Bratislava and Rotterdam. Quite a journey.

It is understood to be the last large delivery expected at the wharf until next Autumn, by which time the much reduced refurbishment of the wharf - currently due to start in January - should have been completed.

Parking on the Track by the Common

Parking on the track is prohibited and access is limited to authorised vehicles. This makes it a much more pleasant for walkers, cyclists and the occasional horse rider. However, there are exceptions to this rule; parishioners who are Blue Badge holders can apply to the parish council for a permit, which must be displayed on the dashboard, allowing them to park on the track to give them a view of the river which would otherwise be denied to them because of the flood banks.

It is important to note that whenever there is an event in the village, someone has to organise and work hard to ensure its success.





Jane Temple - Profile

Jane was born in Shanghai, China, in 1929 and spent the first six years of her life there with her parents and brothers. Her father was a civil engineer and was involved in major road building programmes.

She remembers Miss Sharp's dancing classes with affection and spending time on the family's houseboat, a converted traditional Chinese Junk on the Yangtze River, and her parents, tennis parties at their home. Occasional holidays were spent in Japan. The family left China in 1935 and stayed with their grandmother in Wembdon for a time. Later the family moved to Durlegh Elms and lived with Mr Cuthbert Pardoe (founder of the Bridgwater solicitors). She remembers the days before the reservoir changed the landscape for ever.

When the time came to go to school she was sent as a boarder to her mother's old school, the prestigious Roehampton girls' school near London. Jane recalls happy times there and didn't consider it posh, despite the presence of a few foreign royals. For a period during the war the whole school moved to Newquay in Cornwall, then to Stanford Hall and again to "The Convent of the Sacred Heart" now called

Woldingham School.



During the school holidays she returned to the family home, Hill Cottage in Otterhampton where she still lives. The house was originally rented from the Everards family and later when they were disposing of their land, Jane's parents were able to purchase it at an attractive price. (see photo left) They set up a thriving market garden to meet a growing need for fresh produce during and after the war. Jane was later able to buy the walled garden and other adjacent land.

Horse riding and cycling around the park and out to Combwich and Steart were some of the pleasures of her early life. She remembers the live firing range at Steart as RAF bombers made

practice bombing runs. Later her parents bought her a pony and trap which she used to ferry her friends to Holford Glen and various other places. She was a member of the Pony Club, which was based at Hill House, then a hotel. In 1946 it became St Hilda's school, a private mixed school, but intended primarily for girls, the school was relocated from Westcliffe-on-Sea (Essex) to Hill House. The school closed in the early 1970s. It has since become a Christian Centre.

Combwich was very different in her youth with less than half the current population and many people working locally on the farms, in horticulture, the brush factory and the brickyards where she remembers watching bricks being produced. An occasional trip to Bridgwater was on Mr Haybittle's bus, which would stop and pick up wherever the passengers wanted, regardless of where the bus stop was.

On leaving school, Jane attended Cannington Farm Institute and gained her qualifications as a horticulturalist, after which she returned to her old school Roehampton for three or four years as head gardener, in charge of their 20-acre gardens with staff working under her. A strange experience after being a pupil there for so many years.

At the age of 23 she married Geoff who she had met at Cannington Farm Institute. They moved to Dorset near Ringwood and lived in a thatched cottage. Returning home one day she thought the thatch was alight and called the fire brigade, only to find embarrassingly, it was just paper burning in the grate.

Geoff secured a job as a teacher at an "Approved School" South of Birmingham where his craft skills, particularly pottery were much appreciated. Tragically, during a school hill walking trip, Geoff fell and died, leaving Jane to bring up four children. Her mother was also ailing at that time and so she moved back to the family home in Otterhampton with her children in 1968

Since her marriage Jane hasn't had a formal paid job, bringing up four children was enough, and living the "Good Life". She was secretary of the Stockland flower show and she has been involved in various organisations including the WI, garden clubs and the Somerset Archaeological Society and maintains a strong interest in archaeology. Now ninety years old Jane, is fit and well and drives her car regularly to the Combwich coffee mornings and elsewhere.

Angling Trust by Combwich Resident Dean Asplin

For many reasons the number of people taking part in angling, like in every other sport is in decline. I work for the National Governing Body for Angling, the "Angling Trust" as the Partnership Development Manager. It is my task to get more people to try fishing and therefore hopefully becoming lifelong anglers. Every year we run over 500 'Get Fishing' days nationwide all of which can be found on our events website www.getfishing.org.uk

My very small family and I moved to the village of Combwich in October 2018 and after regularly witnessing the school run past our house to Otterhampton primary school I just knew there might be an opportunity to promote angling to these children and their families. We decided to run three 'Get Fishing' family events mainly in the summer holidays. They were a great success with 49 people having a go over the three days and every single one of them actually caught something!. It was excellent to see many repeat participants, with several families bringing along equipment that they had bought after being inspired at the previous sessions. Because we were using qualified and licenced angling coaches this enabled us to assess what some of the younger participants had learned. This lead to Ava (3yrs old, pic attached) gaining her 'angling starter' skills awards certificate. Jacob (aged 9, picture attached) gained his 'angling starter' and level 1 skills award certificate. Jacob has really taken to the sport and I am sure he will be a life long angler - job done!

I would like to say a big thank you to Bridgwater Angling Club for allowing us to use the Combwich lake and also to the volunteers/angling coaches that helped out on the days: Marcus, Brian and Mark. I would also like to thank Barry at the Otter Tales, Claire the head at Otterhampton primary school, Combwich Post Office and Otterhampton Social Club for all their support in promoting the events.

UPDATE ON THE VILLAGE HALL REFURBISHMENT

Well finally we have some news to report! The Village Hall Committee has applied for Charitable Incorporation Organisation status as discussed at the recent consultation held on 14th September. We have formally registered the land on which the Hall is sited with the Land Registry and expect their positive response very soon. Our Business Plan is ready and we have received tenders for the refurbishment of the Village Hall. The Committee has unanimously chosen their preferred contractor and we hope work will start on the refurbishment in Spring 2020. But first, of course, first we need to obtain the necessary grants to cover all the costs including VAT, new furniture etc. so the next few months will be very busy for the Committee. Full details and copies of the internal and external plans will be in the Refurbishment Update 3 which will be uploaded onto the Combwich website within the next few days.

To help raise much needed funds we are holding a Quiz on *Saturday 23rd November*. The quizmasters are the brilliant Shaun and Mary and the first prize will £50 plus runner up prizes. Food will be provided – lasagne, chilli and vegetarian chilli plus a dessert for just £10 per person. So please come along and support us. HARBOUR VIEW BAR

HPC Construction Site Visit by Tim Jones

During a visit to Australia earlier this year my wife and I were taken to visit a huge open cast gold mine - Super Pit - in Kalgoorlie, Western Australia (Right). Its size is difficult to explain, but the local town was a little like the Wild West populated by fluorescent coated FIFOs (fly in fly out) contractors.

With our close relatives due back to visit us a few months later, they expressed a wish to visit the Hinkley Point C construction site. Planning ahead it was something easily arranged with the extremely helpful staff at EDF's visitor centre in Angel Place, Bridgwater.



Prior to the visit we explained to our guests that rather than FIFOs we had plenty of DIDOs (drive in drive outs), or maybe BIBOs (bused in bussed out), but the theory is the same.

Following a polished video at the visitor centre and a short, interesting presentation, we got to ride on one of the dozens of white "ghost buses" which seem to over populate our local roads, and appear a lot of the time to be empty.

The 45 minutes spent driving around the construction site were absolutely fascinating. There was good commentary, parts of which could have done with a bit more explanation, but all in all it was excellent.

The huge elevated site (after tens of thousands of tons of earth have been moved) is remarkably neat and tidy with various construction areas securely fenced off from each other and only designated walkways joining them. What an amazing feat to bring everything together on such a huge site, although unfortunately, EDF announced on the day of the visit a further delay in completion and up to a £2.9billion increase in costs.

Among the forest of tower cranes, we had a fairly close up view of Big Carl, the largest mobile crane in the world. It would be interesting to know its daily hire cost, but its four year on site stay is stated to be worth a £20 million contract. But it is a lot if crane for the money. Enough aggregate is stored on site (remember the hundreds of Hanson lorries, before the on site wharf opened?) to enable a continuous 72 hour pour of concrete. That's a lot of concrete.

Well done to EDF for keeping the two visits a week going. They can't always be convenient, but as a PR exercise I imagine they are invaluable and I am sure anyone would find the experience fascinating. Fortunately or unfortunately, with EDF's similar reactor at Flamanville in France reportedly a decade behind schedule and well over budget, there could be plenty of opportunity.

Stockland Marshes Permit Application / Renewal


The Stockland Marshes area has always been of interest to villagers, a circular permit access route was introduced in September 2015. This provides permit holders with

the unique code for the padlocks on the pedestrian gates (please refer to map). The old code will be changing on the 15th November.

The permit itself comes in the form of a card which will have its own unique number. There will be a nominal donation of £2 per permit, payable by cash. You can apply for a permit via email, drop into the site office or ring the office number. There's a simple form to complete with your details to ensure we can keep you informed of any changes including path closures that may arise or changes to the padlock code.

Your permit card will come with some regulations that need to be followed to ensure that Stockland Marsh is respected and remains enjoyable for everyone wanting to use the area. Please carry your permit at all times

- 1. Permit to be used by named person only.
- 2. Please keep your dog on a lead.
- 3. Please clean up after your dog.
- 4. Foot users only, no bikes or horses.



Birds



As summer ends and autumn starts we are seeing the arrival of many of our winter residents. Waders and wildfowl such as Redshank, Black-tailed Godwit Teal and Wigeon have moved in and are best seen from Quantock hides and across Stockland Marsh. An American Golden Plover was also spotted in late September amongst European Golden Plover. This rarity would have been blown across the Atlantic in one of the many storm systems that come from the West.
