# Otterhampton Parish Council Chair Julie Evans delivers her annual report -

Welcome to you all and thank you for attending this evening. Our last Annual Assembly did not happen because the first coronavirus lockdown prevented us meeting in person and no legislation was yet in place to allow us to meet virtually; something that we never anticipated would become the norm quite so quickly. Our first meeting by zoom was on 2 July 2020 and this may be one of our last regular public meetings by zoom since we are hoping to meet again in



person in the summer. 1 am very happy to deliver this unique "Annual" Chair's Report, which is both virtual and covers a 2-year period since the last Annual Chair's Report delivered in person was in May



The Parish Council had the steepest of learning curves in common with the whole world when coronavirus hit our corner of that world last year. We had to continue our business first by communicating by telephone and email and then by regular zoom meetings open to the public on the first Thursday of each month. We have made mistakes along the way but, I hope, learned quickly from them and settled into a new way of working which is likely to continue perhaps in some blended way into the future to take advantage of the best of both worlds.

I have been in the Chair for just over two years now and with the ever-brilliant help and advice of our Clerk Aly I would say that I am just beginning to find my feet. On behalf of the Parish, I would like to record our gratitude to Aly for all her hard work. As I identified in May 2019 this is a small Parish; but with a major construction project on our door step and the ongoing development of the WWT facility at Steart, there is an interesting mix of issues to consider in addition to housekeeping issues such as planning applications, tree and grounds maintenance and dog poo bins. The HPC Project has brought with it opportunities as well as inconvenience and as a Parish we are fortunate to have a mitigation fund to spend. Some grants have already been made from this fund and in the past 2 years these have enabled us to provide light at the bus shelter



and to update the defibrillator, now housed in the telephone box beautifully refurbished by Bob and Carol Birkenhead, our thanks to them and to Matt at The Anchor who funds the electric for, and houses, a further defibrillator purchased with the benefit of the mitigation funding. Those potentially lifesaving devices are monitored by a brilliant team of volunteers to ensure they are ready for use when required.

A significant proportion of the mitigation funding for Otterhampton Parish has now been approved to facilitate major refurbishment work on Otterhampton Village Hall. My thanks to the dedicated Committee of Otterhampton Village Hall who have done a fantastic job getting plans together to refurbish the building and executing a rigorous tendering process that now sees work underway so that the building can serve our local community for many years to come. They did all that whilst still keeping the Village Hall open when they could within the rules, quite a feat!

We faced discussion about another potential major development in the village of Combwich in 2020 when a planning consultancy made some tentative gestures toward the Parish Council by way of consultation about a proposal to build houses and a new village hall at the entrance to Combwich. The Parish Council had not indicated support or otherwise for the proposal but were expecting further detail about it when a formal planning application to build 60 houses and a new village hall was submitted in December 2020. The timescale we were given to consult with you and respond to the application was short and over the holiday period. Once more my thanks to Aly who, with help from Bob Birkenhead and Barry Leathwood in particular, organised a survey to gather views and inform the response of the Parish Council to that application. My thanks to all those of you who responded to that survey, a significant percentage of our population did and that level of response was instrumental in giving weight to the Parish Council's opposition to the planning application.

The groundswell of opinion was opposed to a development of this scale and nature and the application was refused. The Parish Council retains an open mind about potential development for housing but it

we have asked Sedgemoor District Council to carry out a Housing Needs Survey. A good response to such survey is vital to inform our response to any future planning application and even if you have no housing need of your own, I would ask you to return the survey when it arrives on your doorstep.

The past year or so has been tough but it has made me **really** appreciate our little corner of the world for its natural beauty, its open spaces and its sense of community. So many parishioners have helped and supported each other more than ever before and I would like to thank in particular the people behind; our school, our shop, our pub, our village hall and our Church for keeping those institutions going and for keeping us all going, within a context of fast changing rules few of us could ever have imagined.

#### **ANNUAL ASSEMBLY 6.5.21**

#### **Annual Accounts to 31.3.21**

The Clerk presented the annual accounts. Summarising receipts and payments, the balance brought forward at 1.4.20 was £39637, plus receipts during the year of £32017, less payments of £32872 equals a balance of £38782 at 31.3.21. This shows a consistent picture year on year demonstrating that we are "living within our means". We sensibly set aside funds each year to pay for things likely to be required in the future such as play area maintenance and eventual replacement, election costs and Combwich track repairs. The Precept (budget) has remained at £26000 for the past 3 years.

The areas of expenditure (and income) that fluctuate year on year are mainly within "Restricted Funds" (funds obtained from external grant funders such as the Hinkley Point C Community Fund) which saw us spend £6340 in 2019/20 (new parish noticeboards and the lighting tower at

#### MAY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

#### **Hinkley Point C Community Fund**

Two applications for funding were approved (by the Somerset Community Foundation Panel) on 30.4.21.

- 1. New mower for OPRA
- 2. Resurfacing of the play area, replacement of the damaged concrete bollard at the play area entrance, new seesaw, refurbishment of the wall and installation of verge marker posts adjacent to the play area. We will be contacting the contractor to secure a date for the play area resurfacing. The play area will need to be closed during this period. As soon as we have a date, we will update residents.

#### **Village Hall Refurbishment:**

Work is well underway on the refurbishment and lots of progress has been made over the past few weeks. Since the scaffolding went up on 12<sup>th</sup> April, double glazing has been installed throughout which looks brilliant. Five new Velux windows have been installed in the Bowls Room to give much needed light and ventilation. This really changes the interior of the Bowls Room which will be so much more welcoming.

New ceilings were installed and plastered in the Bowls Room, Skittle Alley and Small Meeting Room. Unfortunately, asbestos was found in the Harbour View Bar ceiling which has to be removed and the ceiling replaced which will incur an extra cost and delay the removal of the two small walls in the bar area.


However, many of you will have seen that the new electronic front door has been installed which is a practical improvement as well as being visually appealing.

#### Health and Wellbeing Visits on the Up at Steart Marshes! by Nicole Turnbull

One way or another, the covid-19 pandemic has meant that 2020 was a very different year for all of us. This has certainly been the case at Steart Marshes. During these extraordinary times we have managed to



stay open throughout and have seen a distinct change in our visitor profile from that seen in previous years. Talking to, and observing people on site, it has felt like there have been more families, more cyclists, more people walking to access the site from local villages. Also people from the Bridgwater area saying they have recently discovered Steart Marshes for the first time.

It has been great to see an increase in people using the site specifically to enhance their physical and mental health & wellbeing during these difficult times. Spending time in wetlands, or blue space, can be especially beneficial to our wellbeing, improving mood and reducing stress. There is growing evidence that spending time in these blue spaces can be even more beneficial than being in green space. Think of where we often choose to go on a day out... how many people would head to the coast, a lake, a river, a wetland to be by the water? It just makes us feel better!

We monitor visitor and vehicle numbers at Steart Marshes, not as absolute figures due to the complexities of routes and multiple entrances to the site, but we can look at trends over time. Our 2020 data shows an increase in visitors passing the people logger, but this is not backed up by an increase in numbers of vehicles using the main car park. This suggested a shift towards greater numbers of local visitors accessing the site on foot and by bike.

We also carry out an annual visitor survey. The questions are devised in consultation with our insights team at Slimbridge in order to allow certain comparisons between the 10 WWT sites around the UK. Once we have gathered a sufficient number of responses, the insights team

analyse the data and present us with the results. In summary, the Steart Survey 2020 saw:

- 94% of respondents leaving the site knowing that 'wetlands are important'
- A distinct shift towards more families visiting Steart Marshe
- The majority of survey respondents were from local postcodes. 67% from Taunton, 11% from Bristol, 6% from Bath postcode areas
- 63% are frequent visitors (up from 26% in 2017)
- Dwell time on site has increased from previous years
- Between 2017 and 2020 the proportion of visitors arriving at the site:
  - by car has reduced from 93% to 77%
  - on foot or by bike has increased from 5% to 19%

Interestingly, our survey results mirror what was observed by our peers at Shapwick Heath NNR over the same period, with a particular increase in family visits, local people and cyclists.

None of these results are entirely unexpected given the circumstances with the pandemic, but it has been interesting to discover that what we felt from being out and about on the ground, has been backed up by both the visitor data, and the 2020 survey results. It will be interesting to see what happens going forward when we start to bring in visitors from further afield again, yet lose a large number of people currently working and studying from home and popping out for daily exercise at Steart Marshes.

#### HPC Acoustic Fish Deterrent Proposals Challenged by Tim Jones

Dozens of organisations and individuals are opposing Hinkley Point C's bid not to install an acoustic fish deterrent near its cooling water intakes in the Bristol Channel.

The arguments will be heard at a virtual public inquiry due to start on 8 June and last up to nine days. The Inquiry Inspector, who is an environmental scientist and chartered planner, will make his report to the Secretary of State for Defra who will make the final decision.



The Environment Agency will lead opposition to having the acoustic deterrent requirement removed, backed by nearly 70 individuals and organisations including the Institute of Fisheries Management, Natural England and international charity, the Blue Marine Foundation. Following research over a number of decades, the Bristol Channel is recognised as an important nursery for several species of fish.

As part of the original planning application for HPC, EDF proposed a range of measures to protect fish being killed by the plants cooling water intakes. These were a fish return system, special intakes and the acoustic fish deterrent system.

But a report sponsored by the company from the Centre for Environmental, Fisheries and Aquaculture Science, now claims the acoustic deterrent will have a negligible effect on protecting fish stocks in the Bristol Channel.

As a result EDF says installing and maintaining the device two miles offshore in an area subject to dangerous currents is an unacceptable risk, particularly to divers.

The technology is not new and has been tried around the world including at Dungeness Power Station more than 20 years ago.

Which does raise the question why the company bothered suggesting the measure in the first place as both the dangers of working in the Bristol Channel and the technology were already well known.

## Connie & Pete Sanders - Profile

Connie and Pete, now happily retired in Combwich, and with a holiday caravan retreat at Blue Anchor, are enjoying life though they take nothing for granted after busy and interesting lives. They both play their part in the village when Covid restrictions allow. Connie is a regular at the parish council meetings, unafraid to raise an issue of concern in the public session. She is also an active member of the Otterhampton Parish Project Team (OPPT) which scrutinises applications for funding from the HPC Community Fund before passing on their recommendations to the parish council. Connie is also a member of the WI. Peter is a volunteer driver for Otter Wheels and enjoys bell ringing at St Peters Church. Both are regulars



at the Friday Coffee Club and volunteers at the monthly Saturday Market, when conditions allow.



Connie lived at Biffen's Corner until she was 6 and recalls Haybittels bus taking her to and from Combwich school. At the age of 7 she moved with her parents to Brookside Road, Combwich, later attending senior school, at Westover School for Girls. After leaving school she took a job as a Counter Clerk at the Post Office in Bridgwater prior to moving to Bridgwater Borough Council, in the Borough Engineers Department. Connie remembers an amusing occasion taking a call from a man who asked for assistance to get his horse out of the house. His cart horse had been unwell so decided to take it indoors by the fire. Only, overnight the horse died. The dilemma was removing it. The only way out was for a team to take out the living room window.

Years later, wanting a change in her life she took a BTEC course in European Studies, the working of the Commission and Parliament, giving her the opportunity of visiting both parliaments in Strasbourg and Brussels. During this period was involved in setting up the European Information Centre at Bridgwater College for students, who were planning exchange programs, which was officially opened by our regional MEP. Another course lead to an appointment of Administrator at Hinkley Point 'A' Power Station. Later she managed the Volunteer Bureau working out of the Citizens Advice Bureau in Bridgwater.

Pete was raised in Spaxton attending the local schools, and joined the church choir. He spent a great deal of time with his father who worked for the Holm Sand and Gravel Company as a crane driver at Bridgwater docks, unloading the sand dredgers, Steep Holm and Sand Holm.

Aged 11 Pete, one Saturday morning whilst in the crane, was watching his father opening a valve on a concrete bin to allow the discharge prior to the arrival of a ship. His father slipped and fell into the bin. Pete could see his dad 20 foot below lying unconscious. Going for help he saw the last lorry driver and stopped him leaving the dock. Together, with Pete operating the crane, lowered the driver in the grab to

rescue his dad. The driver then took him to hospital. Pete drove his dad's car home to Spaxton to tell his mother. His mother was not pleased!!

When Pete left school he worked as a trainee mechanic for Stacey's Motor's for a time, before joining Thomas Silvey of Bristol, working on the Bristol Channel Trading cargo boats, the Nigel and the Wycliffe. These boats sailed and called at ports within the Bristol Channel, the Severn Estuary and the River Parrett. He then joined British Rail as a lorry driver, when an opportunity arose to become a steam crane driver at Bridgwater Docks. He got the job. It entailed unloading wood pulp for British Cellophane and timber for Hooper's. He unloaded the last ship before the docks closed in 1965. He then worked on a Sand Dredger the Harry Brown dredging in the Bristol Channel for Holm Sand and Gravel Co., Bristol.

For a number of years he was employed as a coach driver for Bakers Coaches and Berry's on continental tours. There were many trips including the passion plays in Oberammergau. He remembers taking Taunton School CCF boys to Check Point Charlie at the Berlin Wall, also Belsen Concentration Camp, which left a lasting experience on the boys. There were happier times, too. There are many memorable moments and if you are ever in Pete's company he can always bring a smile to your face when he is telling his stories.

Connie and Pete met through a mutual friend in 1998 and married in 2000. Together they spent 3 happy years working as Site Managers for the Camping and Caravanning Club sites in the West Country. In 2006 they decided a new challenge was called for and moved to Brittany. They bought a beautiful Breton house with established gardens and little did they know when they bought it that it was known, locally as 'maison de fleurs' (the house with beautiful flower gardens). So, the pressure was on to keep it that way. They lived the "good life" and integrating with the local community which took a little time. Pete being outgoing, took no time in "mucking in" with the neighbours and the locals, and with Connie's knowledge of the language they were welcomed and invited to endless events and settled in nicely.

But, the time had come when they were considering to down size that Connie's father Stan, had fallen and his health was deteriorating and so the move back to the UK was without question. Selling their property in record time eventually moved back to Combwich, in 2017. Back to the family home, and the next stage of their life together.

#### 1st Combwich Brownies

We have been successfully meeting with some of our Brownies using zoom over the last ten months. Not the same as face to face but it has been amazing what we have achieved. The girls have managed to complete various badges and a couple of our older Brownies were presented with their Gold Award, which is the highest achievement possible and involved a lot of hard work. At our first meeting of the new term we made lemonade scones and



then enjoyed eating them with our favourite toppings at a virtual tea party to celebrate Queen Elizabeth's birthday. There was even a badge for this!

We are now very hopeful of starting face to face meetings outside after the spring half term holiday. These will probably be on Saturdays and we are looking forward to welcoming two or three new Brownies and also hoping to welcome back some of our Brownies who have been unable to attend zoom meetings. This is all very exciting and we are planning a varied and interesting programme of activities in line with our current girlguiding remit.

This would be an excellent opportunity for us to welcome any other girls between 7 and 9 years old who would like to come and try some new post lockdown activities and make new friends. We welcome girls from all the surrounding villages and are a very inclusive unit. For more information contact:




