#### New Parish Clerk Mel Catchpole

Hello to all residents of Otterhampton Parish, just a brief introduction of myself as your new clerk.

I live in Coultings with my partner Clive, and our dog Benny, we share 2 Daughters and 6 Grandchildren. My late parents Sylvia and Pat Langley lived in Estuary Park for over 30 years, so I know the Parish and surrounding areas very well. I am Clerk to Crowcombe Parish Council, and until recently was assistant Clerk to Nether Stowey Parish Council for the last 6 years.

On behalf of the Parish Council, we would like to thank Mrs Aly Prowse for all her hard work within the parish over the last 7 years, she will be sadly missed and we wish her well for the future.



#### Now to the report: -

#### **Trees Planting in the Parish**

Two trees have been planted at Crossways, an Oak tree donated by the Women's Institute (WI) along with a Cherry Tree donated by Sedgemoor District Council. Sedgemoor also supplied a Crab apple tree for Steart Church. Many thanks to Robin Prowse for planting these trees.

It has been brought to our attention that a couple of Ash trees have ash die back. Following formal confirmation of this, we will need to fell them and new trees will be planted to replace them. We will update and consult with residents as and when we have further information.

#### Environment Agency (EA) Ground investigation works on the common (flood banks)

Bridgwater Tidal Barrier scheme the (EA) will carry out ground investigation surveys to check the integrity of the flood banks this is opposite the Children's Play area. It is planned to carry out this work on or after 4<sup>th</sup> January 2022. If you require further information, please contact the Clerk

#### **Combwich Wharf**

Vicky Dingwall Community Relations Manager EDF and Alex Urrutia Marine Operations Delivery Lead for EDF attended the Parish Council meeting on 6<sup>th</sup> January, The Wharf is now in its final stage of construction, the pills and fenders are due to be removed. Movement of heavy loads are due to start in March, notice of which will be given in the EDF newsletters.

#### Highways

Dame Withycombe Hill

The County Highways department has agreed to erect safety signage at Dame Withycombe Hill. This will be "Warning pedestrians crossing" signage. A meeting will be held with the appropriate agencies to agree and determine the best location for them.

We have requested the disabled parking bay by the children's play area be re-lined. Highways has advised this will be included within its work schedule request at April 2022, so if it is approved, hopefully the work will be carried out during the 2022/23 financial year.

#### Re-routed Public Right of Way (BW25/14 at Lower Hill Farm Otterhampton)

This was approved on the 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2021 as per map placed on the notice boards and on the Combwich.org.uk website.

#### Avian Flu Alert

Information has been received from the Animal Plant & Health Agency (APHA) advising of new housing measures to protect poultry and captive birds from avian influenza across the UK. It is a legal requirement from the 29th November 2021 for all bird keepers to keep their birds indoors and follow strict biosecurity measures in order to limit the spread and to eradicate the disease.

#### **Changes to Local Government (Town and Parish Council Elections)**

With the recent formation of 'New Somerset Council' it has now been agreed to bring forward the Town and Parish Council elections by one year to May 2022 to align with the Somerset County Council elections. Therefore, if you are interest in applying to become a councillor, please contact the clerk for more information.

#### Precept

Councillors unanimously agreed to retain the Precept at £26000 for 2022/23. This will be submitted to Sedgemoor District Council 21.1.22.

#### **Bicycle Stand at Crossways**

Following on from the report in November Otter Tales, this scheme will now go ahead. There will be 4 stands erected alongside the bus shelter. It is hoped the work will be carried out during February/ March. A licence has been requested from Highways to erect the stands as the land belongs to them. The stands will be provided and installed by "Take a Stand' Life Cycle UK.

# Happy 2022 from all of the trustees of the Otterhampton Village Hall Committee!

2021 was a year of change for the lots of us but also for our village hall. Phase 1 of the refurbishment saw many improvements made to our community asset to make it a more inviting and accessible building, modernising the space and offering improved facilities for parishioners and visitors to utilise and enjoy.

Phase 2 will start on 10<sup>th</sup> Jan with a view to completing the works over the course of six weeks, dependent on building supplies. Various additional improvements will be made externally, including the installation of a disabled ramp to the front entrance, installation of new windows to the Harbour View Bar and the stonework to the front elevation will be repointed.

Internally, we will be addressing feedback regarding the quality of the acoustics in the bar, main hall and skittle alley where panels will be fitted to absorb background noise. The bar will also have a feature wall installed and various other works to improve the overall finish and ambiance. Lastly, new stage lighting will be installed in the main hall.

## **Carol Bradbury—Profile**

"Carol, a quiet unassuming woman, has lived with husband Paul in Combwich since 2000, most of that time working as an IT project manager for FirstGroup and Atos, which meant she travelled around 40,000 miles a year throughout the UK.

In September 2021, together with Paul she attended the OPRA AGM and was promptly elected to the vacant post of secretary and Paul was also elected to the committee. Since then, she has been actively involved with helping to organise the annual fireworks display and the seniors' Christmas dinner. No doubt we will see much more of her in the future.




Born in Oldham, Lancashire in 1956 to an English mother and German father who owned a watch and jewellery shop, behind which the family lived. Starting her education at St Anne's Catholic Primary School, she moved to the brand-new St Albans Comprehensive School in the year the 11-plus examination was abolished. After her 'O' levels she left school to work in the local branch of Barclays Bank and was paid the princely sum of £56 per month. Within 6 months the Equal Pay Act 1970 was enacted, and her pay increased to £84 per month – a massive increase. Until that point, she had no idea that men were paid so much more!

Carol had an unusual upbringing, with a German father, an English mother and an Irish grandmother she was taught to treat everyone with respect and as equals irrespective of their background or status. Her father, Hans Paul Westphal (always called Paul by friends and family) was forcibly conscripted into the German army as soon as he was 16, by which time the war was already in progress. Each regiment had a Gestapo unit attached and he soon learned to despise them when a friend was shot dead for objecting to the actions of one of their officers. As soon as possible he transferred to the Luftwaffe to escape the Gestapo presence. The outlook was quite dim for pilots and, sure enough, he was shot down over North Africa soon after joining. He managed to land by parachute after being shot though the chest and was rescued by US Army officers and given emergency medical treatment before being transferred to the US as prisoner of war. He was hospitalised for 10 months before being transferred to Camp Gruber in Oklahoma. At the end of the war he was given the choice of remaining in the USA, going back to Germany or moving to the UK. He chose the latter and moved to a prisoner of war camp in Oldham where, as a trustee, he was allowed to collect groceries for the camp from a local shop; there he met Carol's mum, Mary Thorpe. He was released from the camp to work in Kew Gardens in September 1947 and kept in touch with Mary every day by letter. He could not claim naturalisation immediately on release, but was given permission to marry Mary in 1952. He was still required to report any changes in status to the police until the release of the Aliens Order 1960, which came into effect in January 1961.

Carol's father

Carol and Paul married when she was eighteen and by the age of twenty she had two sons Lee and Justin. As the children approached school age, Carol wanted to pursue a career and, as Paul hated the 9-5 working life, a role reversal was the



answer and Paul (who was always more creative, says Carol) looked after the house and the children whilst Carol went to work for the Greater Manchester Passenger Transport Executive in their accounts department, working her way up to senior accountant, qualifying as a certified Accountant in 1996. Soon after Deregulation, the bus company was acquired by FirstGroup which was headquartered in Weston-Super-Mare, providing the opportunity for a move to Somerset and work in IT which had always been her interest. Initially working to install Finance systems to defeat the 'Y2K bug' across the Group she then left to work briefly for an IT company before being poached back to FirstGroup as a Project Manager in charge of all Financial systems across the Group.

In 2010 Atos took over IT for FirstGroup and Carol 'TUPE'd' there then dealt with multiple organisations in the UK.

In 2020 during the Covid 19 crisis she was offered redundancy and as her mother was quite ill and needed support she decided to accept. Tragically her mother died last year followed a few weeks later by her brother.

Now with time to spare, she looks forward to spending more time in the lovely community of Combwich which has been her home for many years."



As we start the New Year the Green Recovery funded grounds works on Stockland Marsh are due to recommence. New scrapes and culverts are being added to improve the habitat for a whole range of wildlife including ditch invertebrates and water voles. This does mean that there will be some footpath closures and diversions in place for a few weeks. The works are moveable depending on ground conditions, weather and availability of the machinery, so please follow signage on site.

You may have seen Steart Marshes on the television over the Christmas period? We have a lot of media interest in the research around carbon storage on the saltmarsh. This is a very topical story related to climate change and I'm pleased to say we have BBC Points West and ITV national news filming here this week (mid-December as I write this). ## 1<sup>st</sup> Combwich Brownies

It has been a strange two years for the 1<sup>st</sup> Combwich Brownies. This time two years ago we had 17 Brownies, although only two were from Combwich. We were a thriving unit and felt that the next couple of years would be secure. Then in March COVID struck, and on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2020 with much regret we had to



announce we were stopping meetings. Many other Brownie units around the country immediately started meeting on zoom, and we were given a lot of guidance from Girl Guiding UK on how to do this. However we decided that the girls would have enough to contend with doing their school work on zoom during the lockdown, so we had a complete break. We had no meetings through April, May and June and really started getting quite used to having free Monday evenings. When July came round we decided if we didn't do something soon all the girls would be loosing interest. Girl Guiding was offering free zoom hours to units and we managed to secure some so that we wouldn't have to be cut off after 45 minutes.

It wasn't easy but we ran seven weekly zoom sessions through July and August with 13 girls registered and an average weekly attendance of 8. The topics we managed to cover ranged from making pizza and armpit fudge to a keep fit session and aviation badge.

We took a well earned break for a couple of weeks and then resumed in September with only one girl from the previous term deciding not to carry on. We had learned a lot from the previous term and became a bit more adventurous tackling such things as building lifts, making large scale monuments and creating mini crazy golf courses as well as baking cakes in mugs and tackling the mindfulness badge. We even managed a virtual sleepover with Mermaids and Unicorns as our theme. The girls were challenged to create a den decorated using our theme to sleep in overnight, we created our own bedtime story over hot chocolate with unicorn and mermaid sprinkles and met up again over Zoom for breakfast, crafts and games. Full credit to parents for participating in these activities.

By the time January 2021 arrived we found we were left with 7 most conscientious girls, everyone else seemed to be suffering from zoom weariness. However we carried on regardless with such things as a ballet session, making hedgehog homes, making worry dolls, and lemonade scones, completing several badges along the way.

We resumed in June with 6 Brownies for five meetings with poor attendance, so we decided to try a few outdoor face to face meetings to rekindle enthusiasm but even this proved difficult.

Breaking for the summer we had long discussions about the possibility of going back to proper Monday evening face to face meetings in September. Our main problem was we were now left with 5 Brownies (including the two original Combwich Brownies) who were mostly rising 10 years old and would be leaving in less than a year. Every previous attempt to recruit new Brownies had proved fruitless. Should we just spend the autumn term getting these last few faithful Brownies through their last badges and then close the unit? Maybe!

We tried recruiting again in Otter Tales but it was also displayed as a colourful recruitment post on the Combwich Facebook page.

As the time for the first meeting in September approached we had a few enquiries from interested parents and we told them to bring the girls along to the first meeting to try it. Imagine our surprise when 6 new girls turned up. The following week another 5, taking the total to 17. We set a limit at that 17 until after half term when another 4 joined and one left leaving the grand total of 20, including 7 girls from Combwich.



It has taken several weeks for us to settle down into a proper Brownie unit but we are now almost there and return this month with renewed enthusiasm looking forward to steering all our Brownies in a positive direction to enjoy all the benefits that Girl Guiding brings to the current generation of 7-10 year olds.

We now have a waiting list for any girls up to 9 years old and would be glad to receive names from anyone interested in joining this vibrant, fun loving group of girls. We would also be interested in hearing from any adults who might be interested in coming forward to help us – it is very rewarding and satisfying voluntary work.
