New Councillors

We are pleased to report that we have co-opted three new councillors on to the parish council; Mike Haycraft, Connie Sanders and Amanda Gibbons. We look forward to working alongside them.









Village Walk – 4th August

The Parish Council does not traditionally hold a meeting in August but we do have a village walk to look at areas that may require maintenance or enhancement, some of the measures identified include:

- 1. Bus Shelter requires work due to large cracks in the rear wall.
- 2. Sign Post the damaged sign post needs to be removed.
- 3. Hedges and foliage various hedges need to be cut back and foliage at the rear and side of the OPRA barn on Brookside Road needs to be removed. Other areas in the village also have foliage that needs to be cut back.
- 4. Road Name Signs signs to be replaced have been identified for Estuary Park, Church Hill, Riverside and Harbour View.
- 5. Wharf Road wall the wall at the entrance to Wharf Road has cracks and requires repairing.
- 6. Life Buoy Signpost the signpost is in a state of disrepair and needs to be replaced or removed.
- 7. Play Area Footpaths the new grit on the footpaths is very loose and requires attention.

Findings of the village walk and their remedies are to be discussed at the September meeting.

August Extraordinary Meeting

An extraordinary meeting was held to co-opt the new councillors and to discuss planning matters. A further meeting discussing work at the wharf will take place in September. The date and time will be widely advertised and there will be an opportunity to send in questions prior to the meeting.

Parish Council Meetings

The next parish council meetings will be on Thursday 1st September, Thursday 6th October, Thursday 3rd November and Thursday 1st December starting at 7.00pm, in Otterhampton Village Hall.

Full details of the decisions taken at parish council meetings are contained within the minutes which are available on the three village notice boards (opposite the Post Office, opposite the Anchor Inn by the play area and on the wall of Ferricies Farm, Steart) or the Combwich.org.uk website.


OTTERHAMPTON VILLAGE HALL




The picture of Steve (left) is with the 'PEAL BOARD' - looks like it was drawn up in 1920's perhaps?

Betty Hansford - Profile - 100 years old this month

Betty Hansford born on the 6th September 1922 in London to Scottish parents is still remarkably fit and active.

When she was five her parents split up and together with her mum and baby sister, Jessie (now 95) went to live with her grandparents in Bootle, Lancashire. Most of her schooling including a spell at the business school was in Bootle.

Early memories include listening to King George V1's Christmas Day speech and willing him to complete it fluently, without stammering,

Her first job after leaving business school was with Booker Brothers which was a shipping company operating out of Liverpool and when the offices were destroyed by German hambing during the

and when the offices were destroyed by German bombing during the war, they moved to a new building which is now a branch of Barclays Bank. During the blitz work carried on in the basement.





Fire watching was a very necessary job during these troubled times, but the "girls" were only allowed to do it on a Sunday. Although shipping was a reserved industry Betty wanted to do her bit and joined the Women's Land Army and Timber Corps, stationed in various parts of Cheshire and Wales. The arduous work involved felling trees, measuring timber, sawing pit props and also choosing and felling trees to turn into telephone poles. The work was dangerous, and she once had an axe in her back, though only requiring 3 stitches it was very close to her spine and could have been much more serious. During this period, she had first aid and home nursing lessons. Betty was also a keen member of the Civil Defence Corps.

In 1946 after the war ended, she returned to her job with the shipping company who had paid her a half salary during the time she was away and so she felt obliged to go back. After about six months she

left to marry Lloyd a head forester and together they moved to Selkirk in Scotland to become head forester on a private estate. This was where her son John was born. They then moved to Derbyshire for a better head forester job, where Sheena and Barrie were born, then on to Gloucester, Hampshire and Nottinghamshire. Next was Polesden Lacey in Surrey working for the National Trust. This move provided Betty with an opportunity to work in their South East area office which included working on preparing the Commons Registration Act 1965. She also spent time working as a guide in the house.

After the breakup of her marriage in 1967 Betty moved to a flat in Reigate Surrey with Sheena and Barrie (her eldest son was in the army) and worked in the Town Clerks department during which time

her divorce came through. It was here that she learned Latin American and ballroom dancing in addition to her other hobbies.

Her next job involved a few years as a secretary to a publisher of tropical fish and dog books. This involved regular attendance at Crufts and tropical fish shows in London. This was followed by a job as secretary to the General Secretary of the National Christian Education Council (NCEC) where she worked for three or four years.



In 1972 she met and married Ken who was a film editor for Anglia TV's Survival programmes. They had many lovely holidays. They were both lovers of orchestral music and went to many classical concerts.

Betty always a keen gardener, produced a new variety of geranium sanguineum which she was asked to name by the RHS. She named it South Nufield, after the village they lived in at the time. She has designed and written knitting patterns for both hand and machine knitting and had them published. She has also reared pigs and walked her beloved Labradors.

After nine happy years in Surrey, they moved to Westbury in Wiltshire to be a little nearer family. A regular church goer Betty was asked by her local church to read a lesson in Salisbury Cathedral commemorating the 60-year anniversary of the war and particularly the part women play during that time. It was a very special day.

Some 19 years later when Betty was 90 years old and with Ken's health failing, they moved to Combwich. This turned out to be a wise move and they were able to benefit from help and support from their family. Ken died in 2015.

This month Betty celebrates her 100th Birthday.

Bridgwater Choral Society. The Choir's New Lease of Life.

Bridgwater Choral Society was founded in the early 20th Century and re-formed after the devastation of the Second World War. The Society was due to celebrate 70 years since that re-formation, when Covid 19 caused rehearsals and concerts to cease. In 2021 a further blow was dealt by the sudden resignation of their conductor. This was in the early days of attempting to re-open choirs everywhere after the pandemic.

Strong emotions and much sadness was felt by many, and the Choir faced folding entirely. A group of singers who did not want to see this happen, decided to try to keep the Choir going in some form, under the musical direction of Jackie Ayres, a musician of wide experience, including conducting, which she studied at the Guildhall in London. Elaine Thorneycroft Gibb also offered her support at the start of the season for which we are grateful.

The Autumn Term 2021 culminated in participation in the Civic Carol Service in St Mary's Church, Bridgwater. The conventional 4 part singing of the Choral Society was not possible because of lack of numbers, but a programme of carols and arrangements from across the ages and around the world were extremely well received, and made for a most enjoyable event. The Choir also performed at Fyne Court and Blake Court over the Christmas period.

In January, it was decided to name this new group from within the Choral Society as Harmonia. The Spring Term saw a few more members join, and through the winter, the singers enjoyed preparing suitable material, some of it arranged by their conductor. There was much illness and difficulty of ensuring a balanced sound, but with perseverance and flexibility, a most enjoyable concert took place on 22nd June in St Mary's Church with Frances Webb as our accompanist whose support we greatly value. The balance of sound, which is now that of a chamber choir, is excellent, and there is precision and clarity evident, as well as good attention to dynamics. The programme ranged from English Folk Song arrangements, Hungarian Folk Songs, classical songs by Schubert and Brahms, and John Rutter's lovely Prayer for Ukraine. There was a solo by Mary Morgan, and piano duets by Jackie Ayres and Frances Webb. Publicity for this was kept to a minimum, as Jackie suffered a broken leg just weeks before the concert! However, a very pleasant and sociable evening was enjoyed by the Harmonia group and friends and family who came to support. A collection was taken which was shared by St Mary's Church and the Emergency Appeal for Ukraine.

Harmonia has become an extremely friendly and supportive group. We welcome new members, as well as returning Choral Society members as we restart rehearsals in September 2022 for a new season of Christmas music, followed by a late Spring concert of music from around the world. Many people asked how can we thank Roger for his service to our community (and the post office). Helen Jowett, a prime mover in much that goes on in the parish suggested a tea and cakes event in the village hall to mark the occasion and set about with help from others to organise it. She particularly wants to thank all those who made delicious cakes and biscuits for everyone to enjoy.

A leaflet was produced advising residents of the parish of Roger's pending retirement and suggesting that people might like to make a small donation to mark his retirement and explained how this could be done.

Over £1,000 was donated to the fund organised by Hellen and was presented as a cheque at his retirement do in a packed village hall at the beginning of August. Village stalwart Paul Gripton made the presentation with a humorous speech and handed over the cheque together with a delightful painting by local artist Tom Jacobs, of Roger with his Post Office van on the Pill. Roger graciously accepted the presents and thanked everyone not only for the presentation but for their support over the years. He said he had the best job in the post office getting to know and serve the people of Otterhampton, Combwich and Steart. It was the people who made it all worthwhile.

Later Roger informed Helen that he had received another £1,000 plus, as personal gifts from residents making a total of over £2,000. The amount of money was a tangible expression of the gratitude and affection the people of this parish have for Roger. Postie Extraordinaire!

Dragonfly Hotspot Status by Nicole Turnbull

Steart Marshes has been recognised by the British Dragonfly Society as a hotspot due to the number of species (21 and counting) and the suitability of the habitat. Our launch event on 23 July was a great success, starting with the unveiling of our new information board near the kingfisher bridge by dragonfly gurus Dave Smallshire and Andy Swash. They spoke to the assembled crowd about the importance of Steart Marshes as a hotspot location, led guided walks and were also available to talk about the latest edition of their jointly authored field guide 'Britain's Dragonflies'. A rare variable damselfly even put in an appearance near the new information board!









Events on the day included walks and talks, craft, pond dipping and a treasure hunt. Willow weaving to make dragonflies was so popular that we ran out of willow by the end of the day, so this is something we will definitely be offering again in the future! Ice-creams, samphire and wooden bowls made from Steart wood were sold in the car park and I'm pleased to say that many people had a first taste of our marsh samphire for their dinner Saturday night!

A busy day with visitors, experts and volunteers from WWT and the British Dragonfly Society (BDS) enjoying the activities and learning opportunities on offer. We are proud to be a designated BDS dragonfly hotspot!

We ran a moth identification workshop over the weekend, where we had our own WWT moth expert, Peter Cranswick, visit the reserve to set 4 light traps around the reserve to see what he could find. In total we had about 100 species of moth by the morning including some species that are only normally found at wetlands!


