Getting Ready

Less than twelve months after we all enjoyed the Queen's Platinum Jubilee party, Sunday 7th May 2023 brought the community together once more with a once-in-a-lifetime celebration of the Coronation of King Charles III.

All over the country people held street parties over the extended bank holiday period and the parish of Otterhampton was no exception. Meticulous plans had been in the making since March and a team of dedicated residents gave up hours of their time to organise what turned out to be a fantastic day in the village of Combwich.







Sunday began early for those involved in bringing it together and lots of volunteers were down at the village hall or on the village green hours before kick-off, putting up gazebos, setting up stalls and getting everything ready for the street party. Fortunately, the sun was out with no rain forecast but sadly the common was so waterlogged that grass-cutting had been impossible the week before, so all the activities and stalls had to be squeezed onto the village green.



The celebrations began on the Saturday morning when more than 25 children scoured the village throughout the day, searching for the 20 hidden royal crowns. 22 entries completed the trail and it was a case of picking the winner from a hat, so well done to all who took part and congratulations to Enya Johnson for being the winner.

Bell Ringing

The wonderful sound of the church bells was very much in earshot throughout the weekend. On the day of the Coronation, along with church bell towers across the country, the bells at St. Peter's rang out in celebration to mark the event. Fifteen bell ringers played a Special Coronation Ring that was written for the Queen's Coronation in 1953. This was suggested on the Council for Bell Ringers' website to perform for the Coronation and the bell ringers practiced the performance during the week. On the Coronation Day itself they played it twelve times lasting about an hour.


