Combwich & District WI - *Elizabeth Marriott*



At March's meeting we had the Devon and Somerset Air Ambulance team who give us a talk with video and photos which was incredibly inspirational. They receive no direct funding from the Government or the National Lottery and rely on the generosity of the public for support, their operational costs are over £5 million a year and the approximate cost per mission is £3,000. They dealt with 2,231 missions from 1st April to 31st March 2022 which included 51% trauma, 22% cardiac, 25% medical and 2% transfers during that month alone. They are operational 19 hours every day from 7am to 2am which continued during the Covid pandemic. They also provide an enhanced care service using two outreach cars, one based in Dorset and the other in Somerset which operate between 10am and 10pm every day.



April's meeting we had the lovely Cally Wills giving us a talk on exercise and teaching us some exercises either sitting or standing, it was amazing to feel so much more mobile afterwards, some of the ladies have since joined her weekly class and are thoroughly enjoying them.

May's meeting we had Nicole Turnbull from Steart Marshes Wildlife and Wetland Trust give us a talk with some lovely photos and video of Steart Marshes. We all learnt so much about the wildlife and fauna on our doorstep.

June was members' night; the committee have the night off and the evening is organised by the members and what an evening it was. We thoroughly enjoyed a DVD of a ukulele group playing at the Proms in London and were treated to popcorn, ice creams, cake and hot drinks, the evening was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Our next meeting is Thursday 20th July starting at 7.30pm when we have Ursula Franklin speaking about Mission Penguin and the competition is your smallest teddy bear.

If you are interested in joining our happy band, do come and join us at our next meeting, you will be sure of a warm welcome.

Combwich Memories *by Sheena Tucker*

Wandering round our village, we can see many old buildings that can also be identified in photos taken years ago, and interesting to see how they blend into the surroundings we are familiar with today. However, there are quite a few that have disappeared completely, and little or no trace of them remains.

One such structure is the old garage and stores that once stood on the site of Harbour Court, near the Pill. Apart from being able to pick out the wall that fronted the road through the bushes, with a tell-tale gap at each end where you would have driven in to fill up with 4-Star or whatever your car needed, the site is almost unrecognisable, having been reused for more modern houses. The wooden-faced bungalow would appear to be all that remains of the related buildings from that time. And the lack of passing trade in a small village at the end of a cul-de-sac I suppose did not help its survival. In this photo from 1985, just look at the prices, helpfully given in gallons and litres, but we do also have to remember wages were lower too, of course (In case you are wondering, the equivalent gallon price is around £5.30 and the litre price around £1.20 in today's money)!



How many cars were in the village on those days, I wonder, and does anyone have a photo of their cherished family car from back then, perhaps? When did the garage first open, did you own or were you connected to the garage, or were you a customer with memories of it?

NOTES TO A 'NOT' SO SLEEPY VILLAGE (Six) by Chris Ponka

They say you should never meet your heroes. (Nine times out of ten you could end up disappointed!) Depends who your heroes are though...

My real heroes have always been friends and local people.

People that run the shop, the landlord of the local pub, postmen, local musicians and artists, people that do things for the community... Although...

I was a young lad, it was around 1972 and I was on holiday with my parents in Skegness, which at that time still had a pier with a theatre at the end of it.

Who should be starring in summer season at that theatre?

None other than Norman Wisdom.

Could this be true? Norman Wisdom the big film star – in Skegness at the end of the pier?

He had starred in a Broadway musical (Where he was nominated for a Tony award!) He had starred in a big Hollywood blockbuster of a film ('The Night they Raided Minskys')...

Yet here he now was, at the end of the pier in Skegness.

(His popularity hadn't waned – having separated from his wife, he returned from the USA to look after his children)

Being a bit of a fan, as most kids were, I just had to see the show. It was brilliant, a packed house and Norman was hilarious – total knockabout, pantomime comedy at its finest – he was also a talented musician playing piano, drums, trumpet, saxophone, clarinet etc

After the show I just had to get his autograph!

The show finished about 10.30pm and it was pouring with rain

(Usual Holiday weather for Skeggy!)

About six of us waited at Stage Door for the great man to appear. After the dancers had left along with the supporting acts we continued to wait.

It was still raining – pouring...

Eventually a lady opened the door and said;

'Mr Wisdom won't be coming outside tonight to sign autographs because of the rain'

We all groaned in disappointment.

'However' she continued 'If you'd all care to follow me, Mr Wisdom will be happy to greet you in his dressing room!'

Not only were we going to meet him, we were being allowed into his dressing room!

We stood patiently in a corridor until his dressing room door eventually opened and the six of us piled in.

I looked in the corner, hanging up on a wire coat hanger was *THE* famous suit and cap (Next to an identical one, which he also wore, there being two shows each day!)

A small black & white portable TV stood on his dressing room table. (He was watching the ashes cricket highlights)

We all chatted, laughed and he signed our programmes...

I was lucky enough to meet him again quite a few times, many years later.

In the 2000 New Years Honours List he became SIR NORMAN WISDOM

He had just been knighted by Her Majesty the Queen, as he stood and walked away, he did what we call the 'pantomime trip', whereby as you are walking, you place the toes of one foot behind the heel of the other causing you to 'trip'.

(If not executed correctly and with expert timing you CAN end up flat on your face – I know as I've done it!)

THIS wasn't Norman showing off or trying to steal the show...

He was lightening the mood of a very formal occasion and also saying...

'We're all only human and can fall at any time'

Another reason why Her Majesty laughed....She knew it to be true!

The London Classics Challenge

More people have climbed Everest than have completed the London Classics Challenge. There are three parts to the Challenge, the Ride London 100, Swim Serpentine and the London Marathon. Ride London 100 consists of a 100 mile bike ride out of London, around Surrey and back. Swim Serpentine is a two mile swim around the Serpentine lake in the middle of London and the iconic London Marathon.

My first challenge was the bike ride in 2019. The training was many a Saturday in the saddle developing cycling skills, leg muscle bulk and saddle-sore prevention! When the day arrived, it was glorious sunny weather, perfect for cycling and six hours and forty five minutes later I had completed the first part of the challenge and raised over £1200 for the British Heart Foundation.

Covid then got in the way, as it did for everyone. So it wasn't until last year that I could complete the second part of the challenge. Swimming up and down the pool is a good place to start but it is no substitute for open-water swimming. So, I took my goggles down to Cricket St Thomas and joined a small group of swimmers in the murky waters of their lake. On the day there were many different distances that people were attempting but two miles was my goal. It wasn't plain sailing right from the start as another swimmer flipped my goggles off. I managed to grab them and treading water I got them back in place and carried on. One hour and eight minutes later the second part of the challenge was done.

Just one part to go! The London Marathon is one of the best Marathons in the world. Training started right after Christmas and carrying the extra slice of Christmas cake made initial training hard but not as bad as the dark, wet and windy runs. There are two very different ways to train for a marathon, one is to run further each week and build up the distance in your legs, the second is to run longer each week but split the training over two days. I did the latter which sounded like the easier option, oh how wrong I was! Getting up on a Sunday with tired legs and the thought of running for two hours, having run for three hours on the Saturday, was not easy. A few weeks before the event I did my longest runs, sixteen miles on the Saturday and ten miles on the Sunday. Distance completed now all I had to do was put the two runs together on the day.

Sunday 23rd April 2023, Marathon Day! It was so well organized with very little hanging around at the start and before I knew it, I was off. "Don't go too quick at the start" is the advice everybody is given but it is so hard with adrenaline pumping and the crowds cheering. I quickly found the pace I was going to maintain all the way round. Six miles in, and Cutty Sark is the first of the landmarks. I was feeling good and enjoyed the atmosphere. Running over Tower Bridge with packed crowds either side giving support will remain with me forever. It's such an amazing feeling. Half way round and everything was going to plan, every mile was exactly the same time as the last, my heart rate was under control and I was keeping watered and fueled. Great support from my wife gave me a real boost at mile seventeen which is just when it starts to get hard. The crowds dried up and the city of London gave very little to distract from the aching legs. The real challenge then started, at mile twenty one, everyone said it would be easy from there because you are close to the finish. The reality is you are still five miles from the end. But a surprise cheer from my sisters gave me the belief I could get there. The crowds again played their part, right up to Bird Cage Walk when it goes eerily quiet before turning into the final three hundred and sixty five yards. Five hours and forty minutes after I crossed the start line, I had completed the hardest challenge of my life and raised over £1600 for The Orchard Vale Trust, a local Somerset charity. With the completion of the marathon, I was awarded the London Classics Medal, something I will treasure for the rest of my life.

Garden Club News *Dan Webber*

With trying to find a good alternative to peat free composts I've come across a problem concerning the herbicide aminopyralid which can be found in composts bought in the form of multi purpose composts, farmyard manures or soil improver.

Aminopyralid is a hormone-based weedkiller used on grass land and lawns to kill broad-leaved weeds without harming the grasses. This persistent chemical is not easily broken down and remains in the organic material even after it has passed through the digestive system of an animal or gone through a compost manufacturing process. It gets into garden waste which is made into garden compost by the local authority. It also seems to be making its way into commercially produced peat free garden compost.

I created a hot bed and capped it with a garden centre peat free compost and unfortunately it has aminopyralid in it. As you can see from the photo the tomato plants are distorted and stunted and simply will not grow.



Contaminated compost will affect seed sowing, potting up and mulching. Ask fellow gardeners about which composts work and which ones create problems.

If you're unsure about the manure or compost you have you can test it by germinating some peas or beans in a seed tray with the compost.

The plants will be stunted and new shoots deformed if the compost is contaminated.

Garden Club Help Scheme.

One of the aims of Garden Club is helping each other get what we need from our gardens. With this in mind Garden Club is establishing a garden help scheme for Garden Club members. The scheme will be co-ordinated by Mike Narraway.

To start the scheme, Andy Turnbull the site manager at Hinkley A Station and the volunteer Groundforce team from Hinkley A will help with people's garden projects.

The Hinkley Groundforce team will provide the labour. You will need to provide the materials for the job. The Groundforce team will assess the viability of each project taking into account Health and Safety, and hope to be able to work on the garden projects during the first week in August.

Some comments from the girls:

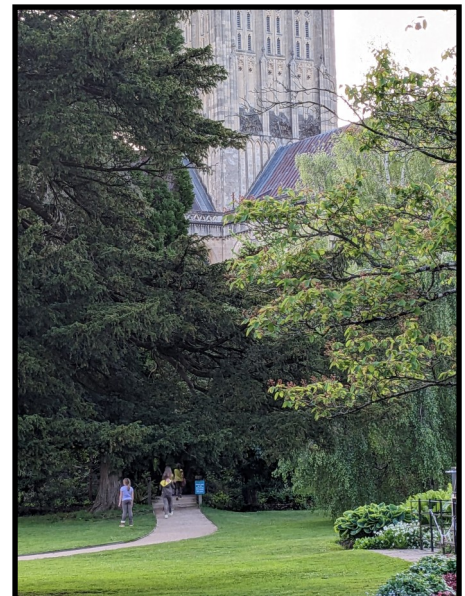

Profile - Chris Ponka *(really more about his dad)*

Chris was born in Mansfield, Nottinghamshire as he wanted to be near his mother.

Yes – Ponka *is* his real name and not just a stage name. *'Who the heck would choose Ponka as a stage name?'* Originating from his Father who was Polish.

'My Father was fourteen when Hitler invaded Poland on September the first 1939. Although he never spoke much about his war experiences (not many did), over the years we would occasionally find snippets of information that we could then piece together.



Born in a small village in South West Poland (*Not too dissimilar in size to Combswich!*)

One day he was playing with his brother along with some friends near a haystack in a field, when they heard a rumble that at first they thought might be thunder. The rumble gradually became louder, which turned out to be motorbikes... followed closely by armoured cars, then tanks - then marching Nazi soldiers...

The houses in the village were raided, there was gunfire. The friends hid behind the haystack.

Soon they were captured and sent to work in a prisoner of war camp.

During the war my Father managed to escape from three prisoner of war camps. Somehow, he managed to find his way to Scotland, where he trained and became part of the Polish Paratrooper regiment.

I remember watching the film 'The Great Escape' with him as a teenager. Occasionally he would smile knowingly and mutter quietly under his breath 'That didn't happen like that' and I realised he was THERE!

Once as a kid, my Mother managed to lock us out of the house. She had lost her key and the only spare house key was inside. My Father got home from work and without panicking or saying much (He never swore!) calmly went to the shed, found an old wire coat hanger, cut a small piece of wire from it and bent it into an 'L' shape. He then proceeded to 'pick' the lock and within seconds, almost like magic – we were inside the house!

I asked how he had managed to do that. 'Have a try' he said. 'It's easy'. It wasn't easy at all – it was impossible! It was later that I realised this must have been his job in the prison camp... Locksmith!

After the war, like many others my Father was given the option of staying in England or returning to Poland. He'd met my Mother by this time, so decided to stay. Though for one entire year after the war – between 1945 and 1946 - he disappeared! There was no trace of where he was, or what he was doing. No contact with either remaining family in Poland or friends in this country.

It wasn't until after his death in 1995 that we discovered he had become part of the secret service, rounding up Nazi war criminals to put on trial. Having been in three prison camps, he had come into contact with many of them and along with others, was a vital witness. (To some atrocities that don't even bear thinking about!)

On his return in 1946 he was ordered to change his surname, just in case of any reprisals from Nazi sympathisers. He chose PONKA, which was the name of his best friend who had been shot and killed while escaping one of the prison camps.

So you see, when working in the Theatre and people sometimes ask if Ponka is my real name and I say yes, although it is indeed on my birth certificate, the answer is not totally accurate.

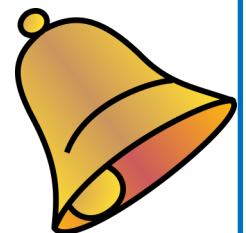

Warden update Sam Wall

Many visitors have asked recently about why the lagoons in front of the Quantock hides and the lagoon north of the breach are so dry. This happens for a few different reasons including the lack of rainfall, the tides currently not being high enough to overtop the water structures and that the lagoons slowly silt up over a number of years. We are looking to dredge these lagoons later in the year (after breeding bird season and before wintering birds arrive) to deepen them to increase the amount of water they hold. This should reduce the amount of time we see the lagoons as dry as they are now over the next few summers before we have to dredge them again.
